

MAYORALTY FIGHT IS ON IN SEATTLE, INTEREST IS KEEN

SEATTLE, April 15.—Following a week of cold and stormy weather, the sun came out brightly this morning as Seattle voters went to the polls to select two candidates for mayor and six for the city council, to be finally balloted upon at the municipal election May 2.

Seven candidates were entered in the mayoralty contest. The warmest campaign was waged between Walter S. Meier, corporation counsel, and Dan Landon, state senator, the latter making his fight on a promise to "clean out the city hall gang."

Other mayoralty aspirants were Charles H. Miller, attorney; Thomas J. Cunningham, insurance man; Ira L. Lundy, canneryman; H. S. Turner, real estate dealer and Dr. Edwin J. Brown, dentist.

Of the 21 candidates for the council, two were women. Lower street car fares and the proposal that operation and maintenance of the municipal street railway system be paid out of the general taxation fund were the major issues.

CHEAP RATES WEST START ON MAY 15

CHICAGO, Ill.—Reductions ranging from 25 to 45 percent will be declared on all railroads west of Chicago and St. Louis in round trip fares to western summer resorts effective in some territories May 15, in others June 1, according to George J. Maguire, chairman of the tariff bureau of the Western Passenger association. Reductions of 20 percent on fares to eastern resorts will be declared on eastern railroads and applied concurrently on the western lines, it was announced. The measure of reduction is declared to be not only the greatest for summer rates since America's entrance into the world war, but far greater than any for a number of years before that war, even when lower reduced fares were offered because the basic rates were much lower. The summer reductions supplement homeseeker rates of a one-way fare plus \$2 for a round trip, which went into effect in March.
