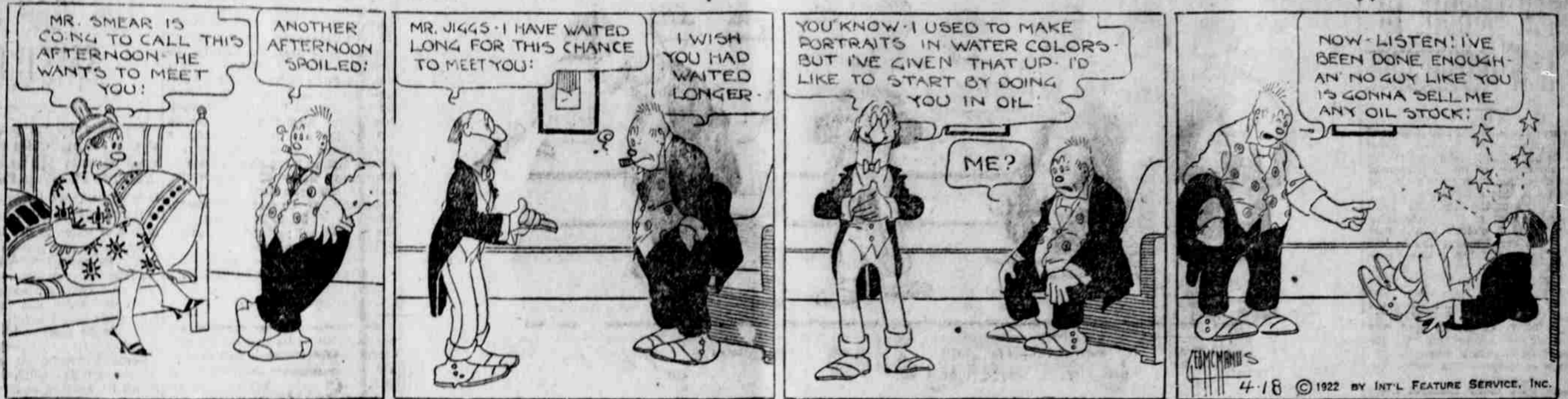

ANOTHER MURDER JURY IS HUNG

The jury reported last night at six o'clock and was discharged.

PROSSER, Wash., April 18.—When a small runabout collided with a large freight truck near Union Gap, six miles south of Yakima recently, the truck was overturned, spilling four tons of beans and scrambling 36 cases of eggs. One of the men on the truck was reported to have been seriously hurt. The runabout was said to have been unharmed by the collision and to have gone on its way without even stopping to ascertain the damage.

Kisses Wife, Shoots Her, Then Suicides

NEW YORK, April 18.—Frank Muller kissed his wife good-bye on a subway platform today then shot her and killed himself. She was taken to a hospital in a serious condition. Mr. and Mrs. Muller had been estranged four years, when she refused to return to him he said, "well, you tell the police how it happened," embraced her, then fired. In Muller's suitcase, found on the platform, was a letter to his parents saying: "By the time you receive this letter you will probably be somewhat upset. Everything has been a failure. I can not live without my wife. It is too bad, Elsie and I could not agree and must be parted. Please take care of Mildred (his daughter). Please bury us in the same grave."
