The state's brief in the notorious Dr. Richard M. Brumfield murder case that excited Roseburg and Douglas county to the point of hysteria has been filed with the supreme court, in reply to the plea of the defense for an appeal. It comprises 94 pages, and in it the contentions of the defense that newspaper articles were "detrimental" to the defendant are combated. Claims of bias and prejudice are denied. The brief written by District Attorney George Neuner, describes the murder as follows: "Space will not permit a detailed statement of the crime which has no parallel in the history of our state. It is the product of a master criminal mind, ingeniously planned and cleverly executed, every step and every move deliberately and premeditatedly considered, weighed and carried out not only in cold but frozen blood."
