# 'CATCH THE VISION' DURVEA TOPIC AT C. OF C. FORUM

M. J. Durvea, manager of the organization and service department of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce spoke fluently and forcibly this noon before the Chamber of Commerce forum at the Hotel Medford on "Catching the Vision."

Mr. Durvea impressed upon the assembly the necessity of doing something for the community in return for the privilege of living and carrying on business therein. He stated that progressive citizens should have visions and that visions and dreams were necessary for progress. He pointed out that all of the greatest statesmen, warriors, authors and reformers were persons of dreams and visions and that they were great because they possessed the ability to make their dreams come true.

The speaker illustrated that dreams must be accompanied by work in order to come true and stated that cities, no matter how favorable their positions do not grow through the operations of Nature but as a result of the activities of man.

He suggested that Medford take as the vision of her goal an improvement in the material things that make for better business and advancement in the spiritual things such as churches, schools, parks, playgrounds and other aids to the home life of a city. A town that is better to live in than another town, he pointed out, is the town in which business is bound to be better.

He stated that the words, "Organization" and "Co-operation" are very much overworked but that they are the words which are making all of the improvements in the American nation today.

He urged all Medford business men, retailers, wholesalers, professional men, and all the rest, to get together under one head and to go to work together for the same thing in order to "Catch the Vision."

A. B. Cunningham acted as chairman and several songs led by Rev. Millard were sung during the meeting.

This property, under the Versailles pact, is pledged to the commission for payment of reparations.

# PASS ORDINANCE CREATING LOCAL PLANNING COM.

The most important step towards progress for the city of Medford was taken by the city council last evening when they passed the ordinance creating a city planning commission.

The action was taken at the solicitation of the Medford chamber of commerce and the Greater Medford club, which organizations were thoroughly pledged to the idea of the immense benefit this commission can be in the establishment of stable realty values and an orderly, sane, and constructive development of the residence districts. The officers of both of these institutions keenly appreciated the action taken and realize that the influence of this commission is to be measured not by the extent of the surface it covers, but by its kind.

The commission is to be appointed by the mayor and approved by the council, two members of which may be residents outside of the city limits, as the jurisdiction of the commission, according to the state law, extends six miles outside of the city limits in every direction, which is to control the platting of property in conformity to established streets.
