

### MEDFORD MEETS ASHLAND BALL TEAM SATURDAY

The high school baseball team will meet the Ashland high school team on the North Holly street grounds Saturday afternoon and a real game of ball is expected. The majority of the members of both teams are high school athletes who have been competing with each other for the past several years and rivalry is expected to be lively.

Booney, Payne, Prescott, Rudy and Dick Singler, Bob Johnston, Owen Donovan, H. Glascock, Aubrey Rees, H. Reichstein, "New Yawk" Buchter, John Braut, Harold Riddle and Clarence Williams are on the squad and all of them have been showing considerable ability in practice. Booney at first and Johnston at third have been doing good work and are two of the strongest hitters, while Owen Donovan, first string catcher

is clever with the willow, although not an extremely hard slugger. Dick Singler at center field and Rudy of short have been showing up well and show speed and cleverness in base running, as does young Donovan. Rees, Payne and Braut are on the sending end of the battery, while Donovan bottles and curls anything they send. The game will start with Rees in the box.

Among the Ashland players are named Rees, Guthrie, Wolsenberger, Young, Bush and others who have been prominent in Ashland high school athletics for the past several years. It is reported that Ashland has a strong team which can give a good display of real snap and accuracy and that a real game will be the result when the two teams mix here Saturday, the first game of the season.

### JOFFRE PLACES A WREATH ON TOMB OF G. WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The annual pilgrimage to Mount Vernon today of the delegates to the congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution was marked by the presence of Marshal Joffre of France, who took part in the exercises.

The French military hero who is concluding his American tour with a five day visit here, was accompanied by Ambassador Jusserand, who planted in the soil of Washington's home a tree from La Grange castle, France, the home of La Fayette, as a gift to the Daughters of the American Revolution. The society also planted a tree brought from Sulgrave Manor, the Washington ancestral home in England and presented through the British embassy.

Wreaths were placed on Washington's tomb by Marshal Joffre and Mrs. George Maynard Miner, president general of the Daughters, and one by the latter also on the tomb of Martha Washington.

Returning here after the exercises, Marshal Joffre and Madame Joffre will dine with the president at the White House.

**Big Fire in Denmark**  
LONDON, April 20.—(By Associated Press.) Fire broke out last night in the harbor district of Aalborg, a seaport of Denmark, spreading rapidly and covering an area of 79 acres by this morning, says a Central News dispatch from Copenhagen. Enormous quantities of grain, timber and fodder were destroyed.

### FRUIT GROWERS AFTER STORAGE AT PORTLAND

SALEM, Ore.—At a meeting held in Portland, Monday, representatives from practically all of the fruit districts of the northwest, including California sat with the Portland Dock commission. It was the purpose of this meeting to place before the commission, the needs of the fruit interests of the northwest of suitable cold storage facilities, which would enable shippers to hold fruit at Portland without loss, before making shipments by water. This would prevent "dumping" of fruit, eliminate the cause for excessive cargoes and would tend to equalize the market. This will not impose a burden of expense on the growers, but will rather cause an increase in returns due to better methods of caring for the fruit at terminals.

According to C. I. Lewis, who represented the Oregon Growers Cooperative association, the outlook is very optimistic and it is expected that definite plans will be made at a later date.

The committee on the advertising of the northwest food apple met at Portland, Monday, to outline plans for this season's advertising. Practically all apple districts signified their intention of combining in this project, except Wenatchee. A sub-committee will be detailed to Wenatchee to solicit their cooperation in the matter of advertising. "Unless all districts can get together," said Mr. C. I. Lewis, chairman of the committee, "the campaign will be dropped until next year."

C. I. Lewis, chairman of this committee presented his resignation due to his leaving for the east. Mr. C. A. Swigart was elected to succeed him.

There are other new wrinkles in this carnival besides this one and those in the huge frame work of Sam Harris, the Texas Kid, one of the largest, fattest and most intelligent and active fat men ever seen with a show. Sam is a farmer and stock raiser at Farmersville, Texas, when not out on the road. He is 48 years old, 6 feet and 2 in. in height, measures around the stomach 6 feet and 1 inch, weighs 691 pounds, has a 34-inch chest expansion, a 71 inch chest measure, and is—well, cutting it short, a whale of a man.

The star in the line of freaks, however, is Luther, who is 23 inches tall, weighs 52 pounds and has four hands and four arms—that is he uses his feet as deftly as he does his hands.

Among the other attractions is Dave Jackson's old time colored minstrels; Rubie G. **Can Pay Income Tax With Victory Notes**

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Collectors of internal revenue were authorized today by Commissioner Blair to receive at par Victory notes of either the 4 1/2 per cent or 3 1/2 per cent series in coupon form in payment of income and profits taxes payable on June 15, 1922 and Victory notes of the 4 1/2 per cent series, in coupon form, in payment of income and profits taxes payable September 15 and December 15, 1922.

Victory notes of the 3 1/2 per cent series will not be acceptable on the payment of income and profits taxes payable September 15 or December 15, 1922, and registered Victory notes will not be acceptable on any payment.

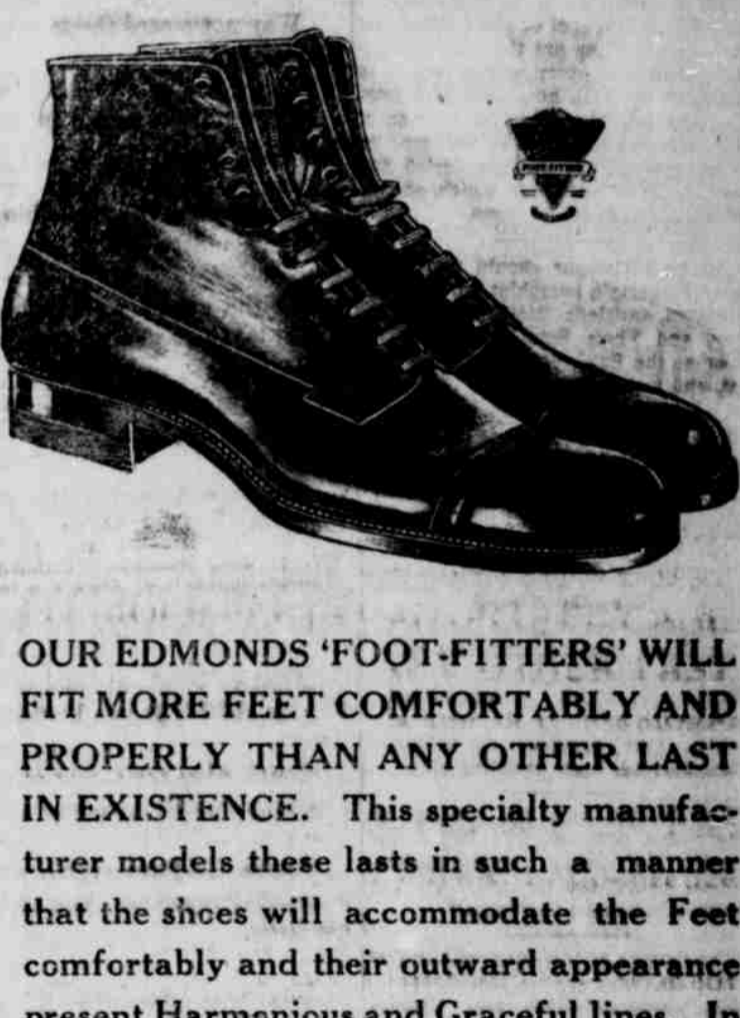
