## GIVE UP CAMP LEWIS EXCEPT FOR TRAINING

WASHINGTON, April 20.—Decision to withdraw from the encampments at Camp Lewis, Wash., and Camp Dix, N. P., the troops composing the divisions now stationed at those posts and to scatter the units in the permanent army posts within the two corps areas has been reached by the war department. The decision was made in connection with a prolonged study of the distribution of the regular army on a basis to provide at the same time for economy of operation and efficiency in training. The two encampments which are to be thus evacuated, will be retained for training and storage purposes, built with only caretaking detachments quartered at the posts.

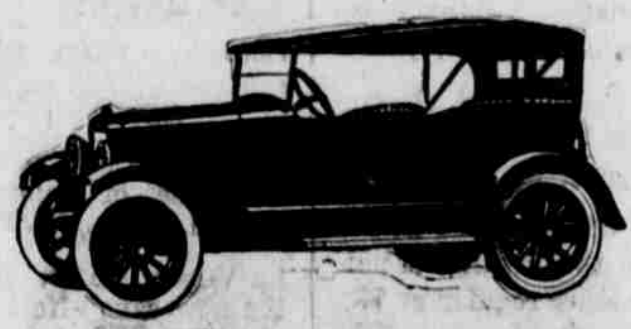
