CHARLEY NICKELL'S FUNERAL TO BE HELD TOMORROW

Funeral services for Charles Nickell, pioneer newspaperman of southern Oregon, who was stricken suddenly at Oakland, Calif., Thursday, will be held Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock at the grave in the Jacksonville cemetery. The body will arrive this evening.

Charles Nickell was born at Yreka, Calif., February 16, 1858, and was 63 years, one month, and 24 days old at the time of death. He started in the newspaper business at the age of 16 years, and devoted the active days of his life in this profession. He was the founder of the Democratic Times at Jacksonville, and afterwards founded the Southern Oregonian in this city. In 1914 he moved to California, where he since made his home. He was well and widely known among the pioneers of Siskiyou and Jackson counties.

He leaves a wife and three daughters to mourn his loss, Mrs. F. A. Bennett of Seattle, Wash., Mrs. Lewis Ulrich of Jacksonville, and Miss Helen Nickell of Oakland, Cal.

Final services will be conducted by the Rev. J. C. Howard of the Presbyterian church of Jacksonville.

CITY COMMENDED FOR PURCHASE OF NEW AUTO CAMP

The work of preparing the new city auto park site for occupancy, began this morning and the job will be rushed through as fast as possible. City Superintendent Davis has a force of men cutting out the brush and burning it, on the city's tract of land along the east side of Bear creek immediately adjoining the Williamson property, which was purchased by the city council this week as the main part of the new camp ground.

Mr. Davis also has steps under way for the immediate erection of a movable bridge over Bear creek to this ground back of the public market, to form the entrance to the camp from South Riverside ave. When this bridge is completed and the brush has all been cut out, the ground along the east side of Bear creek will be graded and leveled, and then the city's buildings on the present leased auto camp will be moved to the new site and put in place there. The new auto camp will be completed for this year, and ready for use within thirty days, although the improvement work will be done gradually throughout the summer, fall and winter until the camp has been standardized.

This move of the city council establishing a permanent camp ground by purchasing the Williamson property for \$6,500 and combining it with the adjacent ground owned by the city along Bear Creek and the city land owned on this side of the creek, has met with general commendation. In fact some of the city's closest citizens who are usually opposed to most any city expenditure have praised the mayor and the council for making the move, as long as it was imperatively necessary for the city to cater to the auto tourist business and establish a permanent standardized camp ground.

LOCAL SCHOOL TO GIVE PERFORMANCE AT H. S. TONIGHT

A diversified program, including songs, dances, a farce and musical numbers will be presented by the combined schools of the city to the patrons of the schools in the high school auditorium tonight. The entertainment will be given as a Parent-Teacher benefit, and the proceeds will go to the various circles to help finance some of their activities. The program, which has been prepared by the school children under the supervision of school officials, will consist of twelve numbers, all different, new and interesting. The high school orchestra and girls high school glee club will participate while the grade schools will be represented by children from every grade.

A generous attendance at tonight's

entertainment is anticipated by the school people, who have made a great effort to give the audience a program that they will enjoy.

SECOND WARNING TO AUTO DRIVERS

Deputy State Motor Vehicle Inspector J. J. McMahon has issued a second official warning to the effect that all headlight violators from this date forth can expect to find themselves in court.

The law requires that the lights be dimmed when approaching another car no matter on what road or street the cars may be, in the city limits or outside. It is advisable, says McMahon, that the lights be left on dim while driving at night on the more congested streets of the city. All violators of the law will be placed under arrest and fined.

Drivers are warned also to observe the speed limit when passing school houses, which under the state law is specified as 12 miles per hour, and under the city ordinance 10 miles per hour. Fourteen violators of the state law regarding school houses were arrested and fined last week in Ashland.

PREDATORY ANIMAL EXPERT IN CITY

Of interest to the farmers of Jackson county is the presence here of Stanley Jewett, head of the federal predatory animal extermination work in this state, and Harry Lindgren, the O. A. C. livestock specialist. Both have their headquarters at County Agent Cate's office.

Mr. Jewett will remain here for several days and put on demonstrations in various sections of how to poison coyotes by the most modern poison, a new supply of which has been received at Mr. Cate's office, as well as a supply of the latest poison for exterminating rats.

Mr. Lindgren is here to start pig feeding experiments with farmers of various sections. All farmers interested in the matters above referred to are urged to get into communication with Messrs. Jewett and Lindgren.
