The weather seems to be changing with the moon as it is pure sunshine all day long.

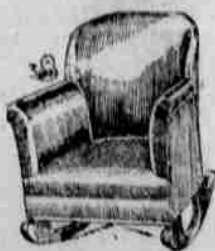
