

RALPH HAND TO WRESTLE TOM RAY GOLD HILL MAY 2

The Gold Hill Boxing commission will put on another boxing and wrestling card at Gold Hill May 2. Ralph Hand will meet Tom Ray of Omaha in the main event which will be a finish wrestling match two best out of three falls. These men will wrestle for seventy-five per cent of the net gate receipts which will be divided seventy-five percent to the winner and twenty-five to the loser. LOCAL CANNERY ANXIOUS TO GET BIG SUPPLY BEANS

The Rogue River Valley Canning company, owned by S. B. Bullis of this city and comprising a large canning plant and a state inspected concrete warehouse of large size has been undergoing extensive improvements and has been considerably enlarged since its erection.

The cannery packed 25,000 cases of canned goods last year most of which were apples and pears with a very few tomatoes and beans and some berries and prunes. The beans and tomatoes packed last year by the cannery were sufficient only to fill ten per cent of the orders which the cannery had for these two commodities. The inability of the cannery to fill the other 90 per cent of the orders was caused by their inability to secure sufficient tomatoes and beans to can.

S. B. Bullis states that the output of the cannery this year will exceed last year's output and that a number of improvements are to be made at the plant. Vacuum generators are to be installed, a dehydrating plant will be put in to handle culls that are not fit for canning and the cold storage capacity of the warehouse will be increased.

Mr. Bullis says that at present the tomato situation is favorable, with a considerable and probably sufficient acreage of tomatoes signed up. However, the cannery is very anxious to sign up a much larger acreage of beans. This acreage must be contracted at once as the beans should be planted in May.

The cannery is ready to handle all the produce that the growers will sell for canning and will can cherries, berries, etc., as soon as the growers come forward with enough of them to warrant canning them. A few blackberries, prunes and cherries were canned last year.

Y. M. C. A. BASEBALL STARTS TONIGHT

The first games of the Y. M. C. A. league are scheduled for tonight, at 4:15 at the Jackson school grounds, the Christian church juniors are slated to meet the Baptists. Some change in the Junior League schedule may be necessary soon, as the Presbyterians have hopes of entering a team. If they are able to do so, the schedule committee will be called at once in order to rearrange the junior schedule to include the five teams, instead of four. For the time being, however, the schedule will stand as published.

At 6:15 tonight the senior teams of the same churches mentioned above will meet on the high school grounds. According to reports from the rival camps, both outfits are in fine fettle and should put up a good contest. The public is invited. It is hoped particularly that church folks will turn out to encourage their respective teams.

something which will hurt no man, woman or child of any country but which you earnestly feel is going to help all countries.

"Now, you will ask, what is this pearl of great price? What does this woman think will help all countries? I'll tell you, it is the pearl of great price that I am striving for—I am striving to take into public life what any man gets from his mother and most men get from their wives if they choose wisely.

Why Not Politics?
"She wants this—just to put into public life what she's always had to put into her home life—else none of her young men would have been here today—unselfishness, vision, courage and cleanliness—the real kind, the kind which helps men to live up to what's best in them, and there's so much good in all men; but only good women can bring it out. It may sometimes seem hard, this mother love, and you will feel that you know better, but you don't really. That's what is hard about being a pioneer; you don't realize, you men, how much you need our help.

"Now, no mother really wants to be disagreeable and often, to make you what you are we have to do disagreeable things. So we feel to make the world better we must do disagreeable things and enter the arena of politics. It's well described as an arena and there's a many a stout of pagan in it, yet in it we must go.

"So gentlemen, how that you know what it's all about, you will see why I am so deeply grateful to you, far more grateful than I can say; for in spite of your thinking us a sex who talks too much we don't even then tell you all we know."

SMALL POX SCARE THOMPSON CREEK

An epidemic of smallpox has been raging in the Thompson creek district in the Applegate section on the Jackson county side. Up to a week ago, when Dr. W. H. P. Ho't, county health officer went out there to establish a quarantine there were 15 or 16 cases of the disease.

The epidemic, which is of a mild type was traced to one man, who while feeling ill shortly after his return from a visit to the Willamette valley broke out with the disease next day after having attended a party in the Thompson creek section. All persons present at the party were exposed and many of them came down with the smallpox later.

SALVATION ARMY RECORD OF YEAR SPLENDID ONE

The Salvation Army in Medford has successfully passed through its first winter, although the past four months have been very hard ones on working people, as many have been without work most of the time. It is the policy of the Salvation Army to supply the immediate needs of every worthy case, and the money collected is used for that purpose. The social and relief work is kept up before anything is taken for the support of the workers themselves, however.

The local corps has been able to give out since Jan. 1, 1922: 328 garments, 53 pairs of shoes, night's lodging to 38 people, give temporary relief to 29 families, also find employment for about 20.

The army has on hand a large quantity of clothes which was not distributed during the winter, and as it is their custom to make a clean-up in the spring they are going to offer them for sale on Wednesday and Thursday at the hall, 320 East Main street, to those who are able to pay a small amount. The proceeds go to pay up the running expenses for the past winter.

HOW TO PRONOUNCE TCHITCHERIN'S NAME

GENOA, April 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—In view of differences over the name of the Russian minister of foreign affairs who is here as head of the Russian delegation, inquiry has been made as to whether it is "Tchitcherin" or "Chitcherin." He prefers to have his name spelled "Tchitcherin," when it is to be read by English speaking people, with the accent on the second syllable.

PROBLEM SMALL TOWN TOPIC AT NOON TOMORROW

"The Future of the Oregon Small Town" is the topic upon which an address will be made by Earl Kilpatrick at the forum of the Medford Chamber of Commerce tomorrow noon.
