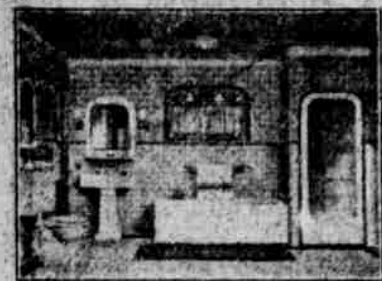

NEW YORK—District Attorney Ruston absolved Frankie Pitcher, lightweight boxer, from blame in connection with the death of Law Brody, who died a few hours after being knocked out in the ninth round of a 12-round bout with Pitcher.

NEW YORK—Edouard Morenas, Belgian cue star, established what experts declared was the highest run on record when he tallied 518 straight points at 18.2 ball line billiards.

SAN FRANCISCO—Ad Santel, light heavyweight wrestling champion of the world, won from Tofts Mondt, intermountain title claimant, when Mondt quit after the first fall, suffering from a torn leg ligament.

JUAREZ—Billy Britton, Kansas City, stopped Gorilla Jones of Alexandria, La., in 12 rounds here. The bout was scheduled for 15 rounds.

LOS ANGELES—Danny Kramer, Boston, scored a technical knockout over "Spec" Ramirez, Los Angeles, in the last round of a four round match.

SEATTLE—Dobby Michaels, New York lightweight knocked out Bert Forbes, Seattle, in the second round, increasing his knockout record to 42.

SEATTLE—Mike Belierino, Filipino defeated Frankie Pantley, northwest bantamweight claimant.

Jimmy Rivers, Tacoma, secured a decision over Kid Johnson, Olympia, in a four round match.

WOMEN VOTERS ARE UNDECIDED

BALTIMORE, April 25.—The difficult problem of whether the National League of Women Voters shall "get into politics" by endorsing or opposing candidates for political office was on the program for consideration today at the league's annual convention here. A debate of the liveliest character was anticipated.

Miss Mary Garrett Hay of New York, Mrs. Solon Jacobs of Alabama and Miss Helen Benbridge of Indiana were selected as leaders in the order named.

Among the reports presented was one on "the year in congress" by Miss Marian I. Parkhurst. Recording the achievements of the league in obtaining national and state legislation for the benefit of womankind, the report gave first place to the passage by congress of the Sheppard-Towner maternity bill, for the enactment of which the maternity league contributed its strongest efforts.

WESTON CONVICTED MURDER CHARGE

BEND, Ore., April 26.—A. J. Weston was convicted of killing R. H. Krug of Sisters, by a verdict returned last night after the jury had deliberated 78 hours. Weston was to be sentenced this afternoon.

This was Weston's second trial, the supreme court recently having granted him a new hearing. Krug was declared to have been tortured in an effort to make him tell the hiding place of his money. Finally killed and his body and cabin burned.

WEED MILLS ARE FULL HANDED

WEED, Cal., April 27.—With 525 men at work in the saw mill and other plants of the Weed Lumber company, General Manager J. M. White announced yesterday that he considered the strike of employees, effective March 7, at an end.

The men have been returning to work since March 22, White said. The workers went out when reduced wages were put into effect and the working hours changed from eight to ten hours.

Guilty of Murder.
IDAHO FALLS, Ida., April 26.—Guy and Clyde Nelson, brothers, found guilty of first degree murder by a superior court jury last night in connection with the death of S. A. Browning, will be sentenced Friday, according to announcement. Browning was shot and killed during a holdup of his store here several months ago.

SWISS LOVER TO BE SENT BACK HOME

WASHINGTON, April 25.—August Probst, a Swiss waiter, who has charged that he was "kidnaped" because of his romantic interest in the daughter of a wealthy member of the fashionable Rolling Rock country club, near Pittsburg, will be deported from the United States under an order issued today by Secretary Henning of the labor department.

In approving the findings of the immigration board which reported that he was illegally in the United States the court granted Probst permission to remain in the United States until May 6 with the announcement that a further extension would be granted if developments warranted the contention of his attorneys that he would be needed as a witness in criminal proceedings.

20 DEAD, 30 HURT IN FIRE IN SPAIN

MALAGA, Spain, April 26.—(By Associated Press.) Twenty persons are known to have lost their lives and thirty were injured in a fire which swept the government buildings last night and was still burning today. It was feared the fire would spread to the customs house, in which great quantities of ammunition destined for use of the Spanish forces in Morocco were stored.
