HELP FOR SMALL TOWN IS URGED BY U. OF O. MAN

Earl Kilpatrick, director of the extension division of the University of Oregon, spoke at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon on 'The Future of the Small Town in Oregon.' Mr. Kilpatrick's address was instructive and interesting and took the audience through the development of the American small town, illustrating its difference from the European small town. The speaker stated that small towns were originally established by the 'team haul.' Meaning that a small town came into existence at the center of a populated territory whose radius was the length of a comfortable drive with a team and loaded wagon. The Saturday afternoons in this town were the scenes of great activity, trading with the merchants by the farmers, trading among the farmers and gossiping. The present degeneration of the small town, stated the speaker, is due to the destruction of the 'team haul' as a measure of distance. The revolutionization of travel effected by motor vehicles has destroyed the small town as a trading center and has emancipated the rural community from the small town. The large trading center is now accessible to the rural population as a result of the advent of the motor car. The postal service and the new methods of communication have also damaged the small town. Mr. Kilpatrick stated that the public is divided into two factions. One, 'Country Over Ailes' and the other, 'God save the small town.' The first faction argues that the small town is unhealthy and a detriment and urges the establishment of a rural center to supplant it. In this rural center they propose, churches, schools, a postoffice, a shipping point for the community, etc. The second faction argues that the rural center will then be a small town as the school teachers, the ministers, the station agent and postmaster will have dwellings and that a store will spring up in spite of all efforts toward suppression and that the 'Country Over Ailes' faction will have created what they have been endeavoring to destroy.
