same striking the truck containing the persons above mentioned. Parties driving the truck apparently were unaware of the approaching train although the warning signal was given by the engineer and fireman. We do not find wherein the railroad company or its employees were in any way to blame for said accident. Cause for the deceased not hearing signals is unobtainable. (Signed) C. E. GATES, F. E. William Eads was eighteen years of age and W. J. Smith was 52. Jury Visits Scene

The jury visited the scene of the accident and then returned to the coroner's office and heard the testimony of the following witnesses: James McDonald, Z. Arnold, Floyd Pickett, W. R. Coleman, E. W. Miller, Cash Woods, Tom Norris, Ned French and the engineer and fireman of the train.

It developed at the inquest that the report that John Eads had been riding a horse and was thrown from it was unfounded. The representative of the Mail Tribune, the conductor of the train and Floyd Pickett all questioned the boy directly after the accident as he was the only conscious member of the party. He stated that he had been riding the horse and gave four of the names of members of the truck party. However he was in a state of delirium and was unable to tell positively where he had been at the time of the accident. It now becomes evident that he was riding on the truck, and according to his written statement jumped just as the truck was struck, which accounts for his escaping severe injury.

It was the belief of spectators at the accident that the horse belonged to one of the injured men and it was taken to the Gitzen livery barn. It developed later, the horse really belonged to E. W. Miller, one of the witnesses at the inquest and he had been riding it near the corner of Third and Central streets when the accident occurred. He was busy caring for the injured men and did not notice at the time that his horse was taken to the barn nor did he have time to inform persons inquiring into the details of the accident that he had been its rider.

Families Distraught
Exceptionally sad circumstances surrounded the families of two of the victims of the auto-truck-train wreck of Monday in Medford. The Grants' Pass Courier says:

Left practically penniless with their wage earners dead or in a critical condition in the Medford hospital, the families of W. J. Smith and J. C. Eads are today facing a serious condition. Grief and despair entered those homes yesterday and not even the many kindnesses of the people of the city have been able to mitigate their suffering. When the men folks left to seek work in California to keep their families in food and clothing, they hoped to send back their wages in a few days. Their untimely end left these families without sufficient funds to even give them the burial they deserve. They can see nothing but hopelessness ahead.

The Courier today has started a fund with a \$10 donation. The money received will be turned over to the Salvation Army to do with as they see best in alleviating the distress in the stricken homes. All donations, no matter how small, will be received at the Courier office and will do much to soften their misfortunes and trials. Mrs. Smith was left without sufficient food to last a week. The Eads family has been in straightened circumstances all winter.
