

## BANK DEPOSITORS DON'T UNDERSTAND JOHNSON LIBERTY

Considerable comment pro and con, has arisen in Jacksonville during the present term of court over the rights, privileges, and freedom granted to W. H. Johnson, former cashier of the Bank of Jacksonville, now ostensibly serving a ten year sentence in the state prison at Salem, upon his plea of guilty, to approximately 29 indictments brought against him, as a result of the failure of the bank. Johnson was subpoenaed as a witness in the case of his half-brother, R. D. Hines, and was supposed to be in charge of a prison guard. He left this morning on the Shasta Limited for Salem.

Johnson roamed at will around the courthouse and courthouse yard, unattended and unrestricted. He was as free as any other citizen, having business before the court. Some of the depositors in the defunct bank were astounded at this, and expressed themselves vigorously.

According to the report Johnson is employed at the state prison as an assistant superintendent at the flax mill in the prison, under the direction of a flax expert from Belgium, and his duties consist of keeping the time records of his fellow prisoners, the books, and general oversight of the workers. According to Sheriff Terrill, Johnson has the use of an auto, and is allowed to drive unattended around the streets of the capitol, with frequent visits to his family. According to reports the former cashier is not subject to many restrictions at the penal institution.

During his stay in Jacksonville, Johnson visited with relatives.

**NEW YORK, April 27.**—The Giants and Yankees were halted temporarily yesterday in the dash pennantward by both Philadelphia teams, the Quakers turning the tables after a series of emphatic trouncings.

Connie Mack's Athletics broke the Yanks' streak of seven straight, pulling the game out of the fire in the ninth when Sam Jones successfully rocketed while the Phillies were out slugging the world's champions, 6 to 4, in a game featured by four circuit drives.

The Giant setback gave the Cubs an opportunity to crowd in a tie for the league leadership, Alexander earning a ten inning decision over Babe Adams of the Pirates in a battle of veteran hurling masters. Kenneth Williams' home run streak in which he collected six in four days, was stopped when Babe Cole twirled Ty Cobb's Tigers to a shutout victory over the Browns. As Cleveland also met defeat at the hands of the White Sox, the Yankees retained their margin over their nearest rivals.

Four Red Sox pitchers were pummeled by Washington for 19 hits and 15 runs, giving the Senators, who apparently are rounding into form, a clean sweep of the series.

Two Brooklyn recruits, Pitcher Vance and Catcher Hungling, were mainly responsible for the ten to one trimming administered to Boston. Hungling knocking in six runs and scoring two himself with a single, double and triple.

Eppa Rixey, Cincinnati's elongated southpaw, pitched the Reds to their second victory of the season, a three to nothing shutout over the St. Louis Cardinals.

## ELECT DIRECTORS, COUNTY FAIR TO OPEN SEPTEMBER

Tentative plans for the permanent buildings to be erected on the fair grounds were shown the stockholders of the fair association at their annual meeting and as far as these plans were outlined they were unanimously endorsed.

Annual reports of the president, H. L. Walther, Treasurer W. H. Gore and the acting secretary, H. O. Frobach, were submitted, and these showed a considerable activity on the part of the directors in preliminary work for a permanent fair.

A lease for the grounds from the city and the county authorities was approved and according to its provisions the city nominated six directors, the county is to name six directors and the fair association nominated eleven.

The directors elected to represent the city are E. C. Gaddis, J. W. Dressler, John H. Carlin, S. I. Brown, W. H. Gore and H. L. Walther.

The stockholders elected C. E. Gates, S. Sumpter Smith, J. C. Pendleton, H. W. Bingham, D. M. Lowe, Geo. Alford, C. C. Cate, M. J. Norris, E. C. Hamilton, Floyd Charley and E. B. Beeson.

The county authorities have not sent in their nominations, but immediately upon receipt of same, the directors will meet and elect officers.

The fair dates selected for this year are September 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16. The first day will be known as entry date.

Stockmen, as well as all citizens of Jackson county are asked to prepare exhibits for this fair which it is expected will be one of the best ever held in the state of Oregon, outside of the state fair. The building equipment will be of the very finest to make it worth.

The California state fair at Sacramento will be held Sept. 2 to 10, the Southern Oregon Exposition and Jackson County Fair, Sept. 12 to 16, Josephine County Fair Sept. 19 to 22, Lane County Fair at Eugene, Sept. 19 to 22, and the Oregon State Fair, Salem, Sept. 25 to 29.
