S. P. Revenue Declines

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—Net revenue of the Southern Pacific Company for its rail operations for the three months period ending March 31 was \$11,080,876, a decrease of \$284,453 from the same period in 1921, according to a statement issued by the company. The net railway operating income for the same period was \$5,865,049, a decrease of \$725,171 from the 1921 quarter.

MEDFORD AWARDED EPWORTH LEAGUE DISTRICT PENNANT

A delegation of 24 Medford Epworthians returned home Monday, bringing the pennant awarded by the second annual convention of the Epworth League, southern district, which was held in Roseburg April 21, 22, and 23. In deciding the contest, consideration is given to the number of delegates present, distance traveled, and the regularity with which the delegates attend the different sessions. The district was surprisingly well represented.

ADVERTISERS ARE USING MORE SPACE IN UP-TO-DATE DAILY NEWSPAPERS

The up-to-date Pacific coast daily newspapers, with the largest circulations, are becoming more and more the logical mediums for national as well as local advertisers. Good roads, paved highways and rural deliveries make modern methods of delivering daily newspapers essential and the people on the farms and in the smaller cities either get their papers the same evening or morning they are published or early the next day. As a result the people are taking the dailies to get the news while it is news, which makes the dailies much more valuable as advertising mediums.

The Mail Tribune is delivered by special carriers the same evening it is published, down the highway to Ashland and in Phoenix, Talent, Jacksonville, Gold Hill and Central Point and along the highway to Central Point. It also goes by mail to Eagle Point, Rogue River and the other towns in the county on publication days. The people living on the rural routes are served by the government carriers early the next day. The same delivery service applies to the Sunday morning Sun.

This enables practically all the people in the trading radius of Medford to get quick delivery of these papers and the increasing circulation shows they appreciate this fact.

- 1 cup Flour
- 3 level teaspoons Baking Powder
