War veterans holding government insurance are to be paid a total of \$1,750,000 as 1922 dividends, according to Kenneth L. Cooper, manager of the Portland office of the United States veterans' bureau. Hundreds of former service men in Oregon are holding converted war risk insurance. Checks will be issued soon, it is believed. Approximately 8000 war veterans in Oregon hold government insurance totalling more than \$35,000,000. Some of this is term insurance and some what is called the converted work risk insurance. The 1922 dividends will range from \$15.30 to \$21.30 to veterans having \$10,000 policies. 32\*
