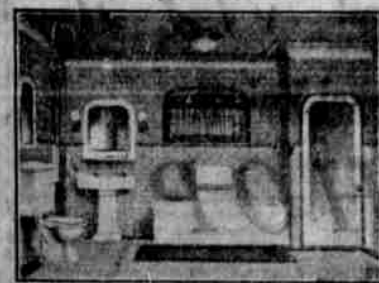

PERSHING SAYS U. S. COULD HAVE PREVENTED WAR

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The United States, "with adequate military preparation and under strong leadership," could have prevented the occurrence of the world war," General Pershing asserted recently in testifying before the senate's military committee in behalf of the war department's plan for an increase in the military establishment's over that proposed by the house.

Failure to recognize the existence of "envy, jealousy and hatred," among nations as among individuals, he said invariably has sent the United States unprepared into a great crisis and caused "unnecessary loss of life and left us staggering under financial burdens."

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The 115,000 estimated strength army bill passed by the house provides a military structure, "below the safe minimum requirements," of the nation. Secretary Weeks told the senate appropriations committee recently in urging that appropriations for the next fiscal year permit a force of 13,000 officers and 150,000 men to be maintained in the regular army. Should the house proposals prevail, he added, not only would the regulars suffer but overseas garrisons would be "inadequate" and "the development of citizen components of our defense system would be seriously checked."

"I am aware of no issue at the present time that threatens to involve us in international complications," Mr. Weeks said. "There is no evidence of foreign designs against us. We must however, recognize that through the greater part of the world, a condition of instability prevails which renders the permanence of world peace uncertain."

"It is certain that to remain weak and unprepared in the face of such a situation is to invite aggression. It is moreover, essential not only that we maintain a reasonable state of preparedness but that it should be a matter of international knowledge that we are so prepared."

Mr. Weeks said the house bill made "inadequate provision for the healthy growth of the national guard."

MISSING SEAPLANE FOUND, ALL SAFE

MIAMI, Fla., April 28.—The seaplane Santa Maria, missing since early Monday, when it began a flight from Key West to Nassau, with six persons aboard, has been found at Wilson Island, according to a wireless received here.

The radio from one of the naval planes sent out early today, stated that the passengers on the Santa Maria were taken to Nassau by a small boat, while the pilot and the mechanic remained with the plane.

IRISH FREE STATE CUT OFF BY STRIKE AGAINST VIOLENCE

LONDON, April 28.—(By the Associated Press)—The Irish free state was cut off from the outside world and even from Ulster recently as a result of the great 24-hour general strike of labor against militarism in Ireland. Telegraphic and telephonic communication had ceased and all means of transportation apparently were halted.

One wireless set was working between military headquarters in Ulster and the Dublin headquarters and since this was reported to be carrying only routine messages it was assumed in Ulster that nothing untoward was happening among her neighbors to the south.

Between London and Dublin there were no means of communication whatever.

LONDON, April 28.—The engineering employees' federation have instructed their members to put lock-out notices into operation, which means that 600,000 men may be idle in a week's time in addition to the 250,000 members of the amalgamated engineering union already out.

FLIVVER NOT JUST CAUSE FOR DIVORCE

TACOMA, April 28.—Failure of a husband to provide nothing more expensive than a flivver to haul his wife around in, is not sufficient grounds for divorce, it was decided in superior court today, when Judge William D. Askren refused the divorce petition of Mrs. Johanna Stevens, 62, against James Stevens, 71.

Mrs. Stevens on the witness stand testified that their domestic bark hit the rocks when her husband insisted on driving a flivver.

"I wouldn't be seen riding in one of those things," she said.

"Petition denied," declared Judge Askren.

\$15,000 BLAZE AT SALEM HOSPITAL

SALEM, Ore., April 28.—Damage estimated at \$15,000 resulted from a fire which broke out at the nurses' home at the state hospital for insane patients at noon Wednesday. Officials said the blaze was caused by defective wiring.

A dozen nurses, members of the night relief at the hospital were asleep on the third floor when the fire broke out, escaped in scanty attire but none of them was injured. The loss was not covered by insurance.

ALL MOTOR VEHICLES MUST HAVE PLATES

SALEM, Ore., April 28.—All motor vehicles with the exception of fire vehicles and fire engines operated and owned by Oregon municipalities must carry the Oregon license plates when operating upon the public highways, according to a decision handed down by Justice Hand of the supreme court recently, upholding the decree of Judge Morrow of the Multnomah county circuit court in the case of the state vs. W. C. Preston.

Preston was convicted in the lower court on a charge of operating a motor vehicle without a state license.

LEVEES BREAK ON MISSISSIPPI MANY DROWNED

NEW ORLEANS, April 27.—As a result of a break in the levee of the Mississippi river at Ferriday, eight of ten small communities as far north as Sicily Island, along the Missouri Pacific railroad are already inundated. The towns of Panola, Jinks, Clayton and other communities will have twenty feet of water within 24 hours, engineers estimated.

Train crews have removed from the stricken area all men, women and children who could be reached.

SHREVEPORT, La., April 27.—Several persons were killed and a number of homes were washed from their foundation when Pontotoc creek, at Nacogdoches, Texas, 75 miles southwest of here, went out of its banks last night, flooding the lowlands, according to a telephone message received today.

NATCHEZ, Miss., April 27.—Flood waters of the Mississippi river, pouring through a rapidly widening crevice in the Wecoma levee this morning reached and entered the town of Ferriday, La., four miles from the break.

Six other towns, including Vidalia, of about 2000 population, are in the immediate path of the flood waters released when the break occurred suddenly at the Wecoma levee in Concordia parish late yesterday. It was certain today that the inundation would cover all of that parish, a large part of Tensas, a part of Catahoula and possibly a part of Franklin and Avoyelles parishes. No hope is held of stopping the flow of water.

Every available boat in Natchez has hastened to the affected territory. Arrangements were being made today to care for all refugees arriving here. Vidalia, about eight miles from Ferriday, the nearest town to the crevice is just across the river from Natchez.

Power boats sent from Natchez arrived at Jinks this afternoon and now are engaged in rescuing women and children. The force of the flood waters from the crevice is so great that houses of the village are being swept away.
