'HAIL THE WOMAN' WONDERFUL PICTURE

U. S. SENATOR ARIZONA HUNTING FOR TROUBLE

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 2.—United States Senator Ralph L. Cameron returned to Phoenix today for the avowed purpose of facing the issue on the matter of a secret indictment which he said "I am led to believe by rumors and newspaper reports, was returned against me by the federal grand jury here almost a year ago."

Senator Cameron went to the office of United States Marshal Tom Sparks and asked if there was a warrant there for him. He was informed that no warrant had ever been submitted to that office for service. The senator next went to United States Commissioner John B. Hencke and asked that bond be arranged to cover any proceedings which might be taken. Although no complaint had been brought to the attention of the federal commissioner, Senator Cameron was told the request would be complied with and a bond arranged.

PRESIDENT DENVER C. OF COMMERCE TO BE FORUM SPEAKER

It is very seldom that members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce have the opportunity to have as their forum speaker a man representing a Chamber of Commerce located east of the Rocky Mountains, but the speaker tomorrow, is not alone the president of the Denver Chamber of Commerce, but is also a man of exceptional executive ability.

His subject is to be "Community Consciousness," which in itself is a guarantee that it carries with it a message that any member from any community may profit therefrom. P. L. Hoak comes to Medford to pay an official visit to the Woodmen of the World, of which he is head counsel, from the head office of that organization which is located in Denver. He arrives from the north tomorrow morning and immediately after the forum address, will be taken on a sight-seeing tour of the valley. The forum will be held at the Medford Hotel at noon.

GAME ASSOCIATION MEETING MAY 4TH

A petition is being circulated signed by a number of fishermen asking the game commission to remove the restrictions at the Ament dam so people can fish from it, as they did last season, this being one of the few places in the river where salmon can be caught.

This proposition has to be acted upon by the game commission at one of their monthly meetings. Neither the state game warden nor any one of the commissioners has power to act.

The Jackson County Game Protective association was formed so that such things could be taken up and settled before appealing to the game commission. They have said they will refer all such petitions to the game association of that county before taking action on same.

The above mentioned petition has not been taken up with the local association and to avoid delay, as the commission only meets once a month, and the time for salmon fishing is getting short, a meeting of the Jackson County Game Protective association is called for Friday evening, May 4th, at the public library at 7:30 for this purpose so that Commissioner Bert Anderson can take it up with the commission at its meeting May 8th.

WOMEN FORM AN OVERSEAS LEGION

WASHINGTON, May 2.—American women who served behind the lines during the world war, frying doughnuts, nursing the wounded and doing innumerable other tasks for which only feminine hands are fitted met here today in the first grand reunion since the armistice. The meeting was held under the auspices of the women's overseas legion, an organization which will be given a federal charter under a bill recently favorably reported to the house.

The assembly will continue several days and will be addressed by General Pershing and be received by Mrs. Harding at the White House.

BIGAMIST MUST MEMORIZE LAW

LOS ANGELES, May 2.—Memorizing 276 sections of the California penal code is one of the conditions of the probation granted Walroth Oliver, who pleaded guilty to bigamy, but declared he had committed that felony through ignorance of the law.

Instead of waiting a year before remarrying after obtaining an interlocutory decree of divorce, Oliver waited only four days. In granting probation, the court specified 276 sections of the code, all regarding marriage and told Oliver he must pass an examination on them within a year.

SPOKANE VOTES ON BARRING JITNEYS FROM CITY ST'S.

SPOKANE, May 2.—After nearly a year of controversy, Spokane's transportation problems are being settled at the polls today. The voters are asked to decide whether a new franchise will be granted to the street car systems, which if the proposal carries are to be united.

The question of motor bus transportation became an issue in Spokane last summer after the street railways had been granted an eight cent fare. The city commissioners stood back of the jitneys which charged a five cent fare. If the franchise carries, the jitneys will be barred from the city streets after January 1, 1923.

The street car companies have agreed to unite their interests, give universal transfers and charge six cent ticket and seven cent cash fares. A school board election also is being conducted today. Two men are to be selected from a field of six.
