LITTLE LAD SAVES CHUM FROM DEATH

Four-year-old Raymond Lewis, who lives with his parents on Catherine street in Southwest Medford narrowly escaped drowning recently while playing with his chum, five-year-old Charlie Johnston, who also lives on Catherine street not far from Raymond.

The two boys were playing near a large hole in a vacant lot. The hole is 14 or 15 feet deep and water comes to a level about two feet below the top. At some time the hole had been completely covered by a board platform, but the edge was caved in and left a space where the chubby four-year-old boy slipped in.

Charles grabbed a board that was handy and the first time his little chum came to the surface he held

the board out to him. Ray grabbed hold of it and Charles pulled him out. This was quite a feat for Charles, as he weighs less than his younger, but chubby companion. He says that the way he happened to think of it was that he remembered his father reading to him of the time when Clarence Pankey fell in a well some time ago and that his father had read of the neighbors running for boards and ladders etc., when Mr. Pankey's cries for help were finally heard.

The Daily Bank Robbery

DENVER, Colo., May 3—After firing nine shots of nitroglycerine which practically wrecked the frame building of the First National bank at LaFayette, 15 miles from here, early this morning, bandits escaped with approximately \$12,000 in currency and Liberty bonds.

George Stubbs, night marshal, was bound and gagged in the alley while the robbers were blowing the bank vault.

When released he said that four of them entered the town at 3 o'clock this morning and overpowered him. O. C. Alderson, one of the residents awakened by the blasts attempted to drive off the band. He was shot in the leg and seriously wounded.

FRANCE TO STAND PAT

The report, which was adopted, contains nineteen resolutions, among which is a recommendation that the Bank of England call a meeting of the Central banks of issue to regulate credit policy and study currency reforms.

The reform also urges an international convention to co-ordinate the demand for gold which should be adopted as the standard for European currencies.

The report of the transport commission was adopted and then the session adjourned.

Richard Washburn Child, the American ambassador was among the visitors at the session.

Call R. R. Convention
The report of the transport commission which was presented by Foreign Minister Jaspard of Belgium, provides for the calling of a railway convention in Paris to discuss the improvement of European transportation. It urges the universal adoption of the Barcelona convention for railway regulation, agreed upon at the transportation conference a year ago.

Lithuania, Rumania, Holland, Portugal, Russia, Germany and many other countries make reservations which are more numerous than the articles of the report. They offer their unsettled boundaries and various other reasons for their failure to give the report unconditional approval and as an explanation of their ability to endorse the Barcelona resolutions.

The disarmament question was not generally discussed except by the foreign ministers of both Russia and Germany.

BEVERIDGE DEFEATS NEW

pliancy of slightly more than one-third of the vote cast in yesterday's republican primary election gave Albert J. Beveridge a lead of 4719 votes over Senator Harry S. New in their contest for the nomination for United States senator. In 1250 of the 3382 precincts in the state Beveridge received 64,442 votes against 59,723 for New.

CHINESE GENERAL KILLED

are engaged in an attempt to destroy the Mukden railroad at Shanhai-kwan.

Terrific Explosion.
Fighting has been resumed south of the Peking wall. A terrific explosion this morning shook the windows of the city. It was attributed to the destruction of an arsenal by bombs dropped from airplanes appearing from General Chang's army.

Admiral Joseph Strauss, commander of the American Asiatic fleet after a conference with Minister Schurman, ordered the gunboat Wilmington to proceed from Hong Kong to Tien Tsin. The foreign vessels now at Tien Tsin include three Japanese torpedo boats, a British submarine tender, a French gunboat and an Italian gunboat. They will guard the Pei-Ho, the river running inland from Taku to Tien Tsin. Reports that he had resigned were

denied today by Acting Premier Chow Tsu-Chi. He said he intended to retain his post.

President Hsu Shih-Chang and his cabinet in Peking continue to profess neutrality.

absolutely unwarranted, un-American and dangerous to the peace of the community.

Now therefore be it resolved, by Medford, Oregon, Post No. 15, of the American Legion, that we call the attention of the public at large to the principles upon which the American

Legion is organized, as expressed in the preamble to the constitution of our local post, to-wit:

To uphold and defend the constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the great war; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safe guard to transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy;

to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by devotion to mutual helpfulness.

And further that we place ourselves on record as offering the support of this organization to the community to insure in any manner we may, its peace and tranquility.

Since that time a member of the Legion who supported this resolution has received a threatening letter, supposedly from the Ku Klux Klan, expressly condemning his support of the resolution.

The resolution above quoted was offered again at a regular and representative meeting last night, and again voted down, after a statement

by a member of the Legion, that the passage of such a resolution would disrupt the Legion.

The above facts show so clearly the majority sentiment of the Medford Post of the American Legion, a sentiment which is entirely contrary to our conception of what should be the attitude of an American citizen, that we feel it to be our duty to hand you our resignation as members of the Medford Post of the American Legion.
