BEVERIDGE VERSUS NEW.

THE VICTORY of Beveridge is, of course, a defeat for the old
guard. Beveridge was one of the original Bull Moosers, and
went down in the political Armageddon with his leader, the late
Colonel Roosevelt.

But Beveridge didn't follow Vic Murdock and join the Demo-
cratic party, nor did he follow Hiram Johnson and form his own
party. He retired from politics and proceeded to write the "Life
of John Marshall."

This showed good judgment. For the "Life of Marshall" has
brought Beveridge fame and fortune and friends,—all valuable as-
sets in any political renaissance. Indiana, moreover, has a weak-
ness for literary distinction. The Indianians take a great pride in
their record from Riley to George Ade and McCutcheon. They
couldn't very well cast the author of John Marshall into oblivion.

The only novel thing about Beveridge's opponent is his name. In-
stead of New it should have been Normalee. Senator New is a fine
type of the old fashioned Republican,—a good God fearing man, safe
and sound, with the most sublime faith in the innate superiority of all
Republicans over Democrats. He would disown any daughter who
would as much as wink at a man who ever voted the Democratic
ticket, and take genuine pride in such action. One must, in a way,
respect such devotion. But it is rather pathetic, for it symbolizes a
type that is so rapidly passing.

But those who predict Beveridge will join the irreconcilable mi-
nority and proceed to pull up senatorial traditions by the "grass
roots," are due for a rude awakening. Like nearly every other sen-
ator, potential or arrived, Beveridge has certain designs on the White
House. And the road to the White House no longer demands the
qualities of a rough rider.

Which means Beveridge will be "constructive." Not a liability
to his party, but a decided asset. And those who may smile at the In-
diana senators lofty aspirations, misjudge the quality of the man.
Beveridge represents a rare species these days. He is really of presi-
dential timber.

LOCAL MINISTERS
ATTEND MEETING
KLAMATH FALLS

Rev. J. K. Howard, pastor of the
Presbyterian church at Jacksonville
and Rev. E. P. Lawrence accom-
panied by Mrs. E. P. Lawrence and
Mrs. Effie Taylor, drove to Klamath
Falls by way of the Topsy grade road
on Tuesday, making the trip in six
and a half hours running time. The
return trip was made in six hours
Wednesday. The roads were in fine
condition, with the exception of the
twenty-five miles from Hot Springs
to Keno, which are pretty rough yet
are fast disappearing. The local
ministers participated in the instal-
lation services of Rev. Arthur Rice,
the successor of Rev. E. P. Lawrence
on that field. A large and enthusias-
tic audience gathered for the occa-
sion. Rev. Edwin Edgar, pastor of
the Presbyterian church at Merrill,
formerly of Central Point, preached
the sermon, while Rev. J. K. Howard
asked the constitutional questions,
and gave the charge to the pastor
and Rev. E. P. Lawrence, the charge
to the people over whom he had for-
merly been pastor for three and a
half years.

An enjoyable social hour with ice
cream and cake, followed by brief
and spicy toasts from visitors and
several of the enthusiastic local
workers was held in the spacious
dining room in the basement. Even
in the face of unsettled local con-
ditions, the church with its fine new
pipe organ and new pastor and wife,
is having the best attendance and in-
terest in its history. The new pipe
organ, which had been planned for
and ordered with the completion of
the new church building has been in-
stalled since the leaving of Mr. Law-
rence. It is a beautiful and imposing
instrument manufactured by the
Hoecker Pipe Organ company of
Hagerstown, Maryland and cost, in-
stalled \$1500. It is a two-manual
organ with the most up to date elec-
trical equipment and a fine and
choice array of stops. It is the only
pipe organ in Southern Oregon south
of Eugene outside of the organ in
the Presbyterian organ in Medford,
and of course, is a much later type
of organ. Rev. Arthur Rice is a
most promising young man in the
ministry, a hard worker and earnest
and appreciative of the problems of
church and ministry of the present
day.

one to plan their vacation trips, give
mileage to be covered and point out
the scenic spots that may be seen
along the way.

The officers of the Medford Cham-

fight, been successful in getting six
hundred dollars of state funds to
maintain this office here. It will re-
lieve the present small force of much
of this work and give the touring
public a better service than was pos-
sible in the past.
