JACKSONVILLE MAN IS GIVEN PERMIT DIAMOND L. HOTEL

PORTLAND, May 4.—Permit for creation of a summer resort on Diamond lake has been granted George Howard of Jacksonville, by the United States forest service. It was announced this morning.

Under the conditions of the permit, boats will be placed on the lake by July 1, a store and gasoline station will be installed and construction will begin this summer on the main resort building, which is to be ready for occupancy next summer. The project will cost approximately \$15,000, according to the forest service.

Diamond lake is now accessible by auto, but only over one of two undeveloped roads. One is a cut off from the Crater Lake highway, some 15 miles above Prospect, and the other a road from The Dalles-California highway. The forest service has agreed to improve the spur from the Crater Lake road, it was announced.

FARM MOVIES TO BE SHOWN HERE

Moving pictures will be shown in four of the rural communities of the county next week. A generator has been obtained by the Farm Bureau and films will be shown at community meetings at the following places at 8 o'clock—Applegate, Tuesday, May 9th, Brownsboro, May 10th, Wimer, May 11th, and Ruch, May 12th. Discussions will be held and all are urged to attend. The schoolhouse will be used at Brownsboro and Ruch and the Grange and community hall at Wimer and Applegate.

LIST REFUGEES ON MISSISSIPPI REACHES 40,000

NEW ORLEANS, May 4.—The Mississippi river and its tributaries continue to spread over a large section of Louisiana and Mississippi and today extended far from the crevasses and spillways. It is estimated by Vicksburg Red Cross officials that 40,000 will need aid in that section until new food crops can be produced.

The congressional party which is investigating the flood conditions, proceeded southward today toward Natchez where it is expected to land late today.

Rich farm lands in Rapides and Avoyelles parishes, sixty miles from the Mississippi river are threatened, according to reports received here by the junction of water pouring through the crevasse at Faraday with backwater in the Red river basin. Reports of the break at Poydras, south of New Orleans, said the water was encroaching on lands hitherto regarded as safe from floods.

Six thousand persons are reported driven from their homes in St. Martin parish and suffering for food.

They admitted, says the Exchange Telegraph correspondent, that they were considering various offers of oil concessions, which they said constituted for Russia a basis of future international policy, and they were studying a plan to divide the Baku and Greeney fields into four or five zones, one of which the soviets would operate granting concessions on the others to rival national groups such as the American, British, Belgian and French. This, however, the soviet delegates said, would be conditional upon de jure recognition and adequate financial help.
