SPITEFUL WIFE GETS 5 YEARS IN JAIL

TACOMA, May 5.—Because she married a Camp Lewis soldier spitefully her husband, Mrs. Ethel Williams of Seattle, was sentenced to from one to five years in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla by Superior Judge M. L. Clifford today. The woman, who is only 22 years of age, pleaded guilty to bigamy when arraigned.

Jack Has "Seen" Europe
PARIS, May 5.—(By Associated Press.) Jack Dempsey told the Associated Press today it was almost certain he would meet Georges Carpentier again, in London or Paris, late this year, if Carpentier defeats Ted Lewis in London May 11, and provided the purse is satisfactory.

The posting of forfeits and other details, Dempsey added are being discussed in London by Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, and Francois Descamps, manager of Carpentier.

Definite arrangements however, are awaiting the outcome of the Lewis-Carpentier fight. Dempsey asserted it was immaterial to him whether he met Willard before or after his second go with the French champion.

"I am also ready to meet Willa or anyone else, provided they meet business," said the champion. "I hope something definite will come out of all these offers. All I want is a few months training. I've seen Europe and had a fine rest and am anxious to get back to work. I shall leave Paris for London Tuesday and shall probably sail for New York May 12."

Dempsey characterized as pure nonsense the reports linking his name with an actress who has been much in the public eye of late. He also denied recent reports that he was going to marry a French girl.

"All the reports about that" he said are pure bunk. As I have already told you, my heart is in America, where it is held tightly by an American girl."

Yankees and St. Louis Lead

NEW YORK, May 5.—The Yankees and St. Louis are dividing the honors of first place in the American league today. The Browns lost to Detroit 5 to 6 yesterday although Williams of St. Louis slammed out his tenth home run, again breaking Babe Ruth's 1921 record up to May 6. The Yanks were idle in Philadelphia.

Cleveland's heavy hitters were not mystified by Faber of the White Sox, scoring ten hits and five runs off his delivery in seven innings. Chicago staged a late futile rally.
