Spray for Garden Truck and Roses

Every person interested in gardens, roses and other shrubbery at this time of the year is having more or less trouble with various kinds of insects which infest practically all kinds of plants. There are two or three simple remedies which are not very expensive which everyone should have on hand if they wish to control insects which do so much damage at this time of the year. These materials can be obtained at the Monarch seed store and possible other places in town.

For sucking insects, such as aphids, get a small supply of neocidust, which contains nicotine and sulphur. Apply this in the dust form to all plants which are infested with aphids. This can also be applied with the regular duster or with a cloth sack. This is especially good for aphids on roses and other plants.
