

IRISH COUNTESS, ERIN'S JOAN D'ARC VISITS MEDFORD

Medford, Friday afternoon, had for a short visit the Irish delegation, consisting of Countess Markiewicz, Miss Kathleen Barry and Honorable J. J. O'Kelly, who are touring the country in behalf of the Irish Republic.

The Reverend John Powers had wired an invitation on Thursday evening to them to auto from Medford to Ashland. Upon the arrival of train 53 the women met by Father Powers and in Mrs. Burroughs' auto, driven by John Brophy, they were hurried to St. Mary's Academy. After a brief stay there, they were given a ride over the highway to Ashland where they entrained for San Francisco. The distinguished visitors were charmed with the scenery of Rogue River valley.

Countess Markiewicz is the daughter of Lord Booth-Gore of Lough Gill Sligo, Ireland. She was the organizer of the boy scouts in Ireland. In the Easter uprising of 1916 for independence, the countess was a fearless leader of a company of soldiers. She is called the "Joan of Arc" of Ireland. Miss Kathleen Barry is the sister of Kevin Barry, who was hanged eighteen months ago for refusing to betray his comrades. At the time of his death he was eighteen years old and a medical student. Honorable J. J. O'Kelly is president of the Gaelic league. The delegation are convinced the Anglo-Irish treaty will be defeated in the referendum vote and that the Irish Republic will be sustained.

COUNTY Y. M. C. A. TO HOLD AN INSTITUTE BEGINNING MAY 14TH

Beginning with Sunday, May 14 and continuing for the three days following, Jackson County Young Men's Christian Association will hold a training institute for all committeemen, workers and friends of the organization. The sessions will be fairly evenly divided between Medford and Ashland so that other points in the county may find it convenient to attend.

The principal speaker will be J. C. Clark, of Shanghai, China, who for ten years has been engaged in Y. M. C. A. work in that city. Mr. Clark is a northwest man who will be remembered by some residents of the valley as one of the most promising of the younger Y. M. C. A. secretaries in the northwest at the time that he took up the foreign work. The years have made good that promise and Mr. Clark comes to America on furlough with a ripe experience with the boys of the Far East and a thrilling message regarding the progress of Christianity among the millions of that vast health-en empire.

Appearing also on the institute program will be Forrest P. Knapp, one of the state secretaries of California, and John H. Rudd, state county work secretary of Oregon.

Plans are being made which will no doubt result in these men making addresses in the pulpits of Ashland, Talent, Phoenix, Medford and Central Point on Sunday the 14th. Mr. Clark will speak in Ashland in the morning and in Medford in the evening and the other men will be assigned as soon as final arrangements can be completed.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday will be given over to institute sessions which will be inspirational and instructive and in which many topics pertaining to county work will be discussed.

A complete program of the institute will be published later.

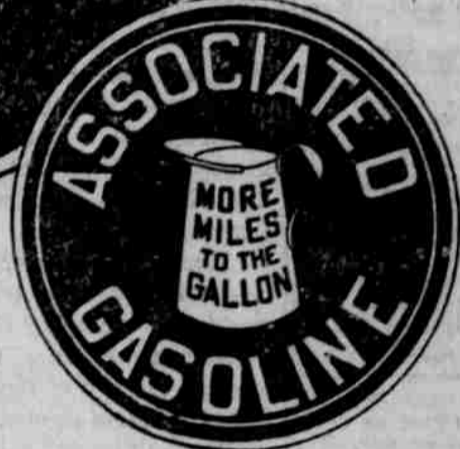
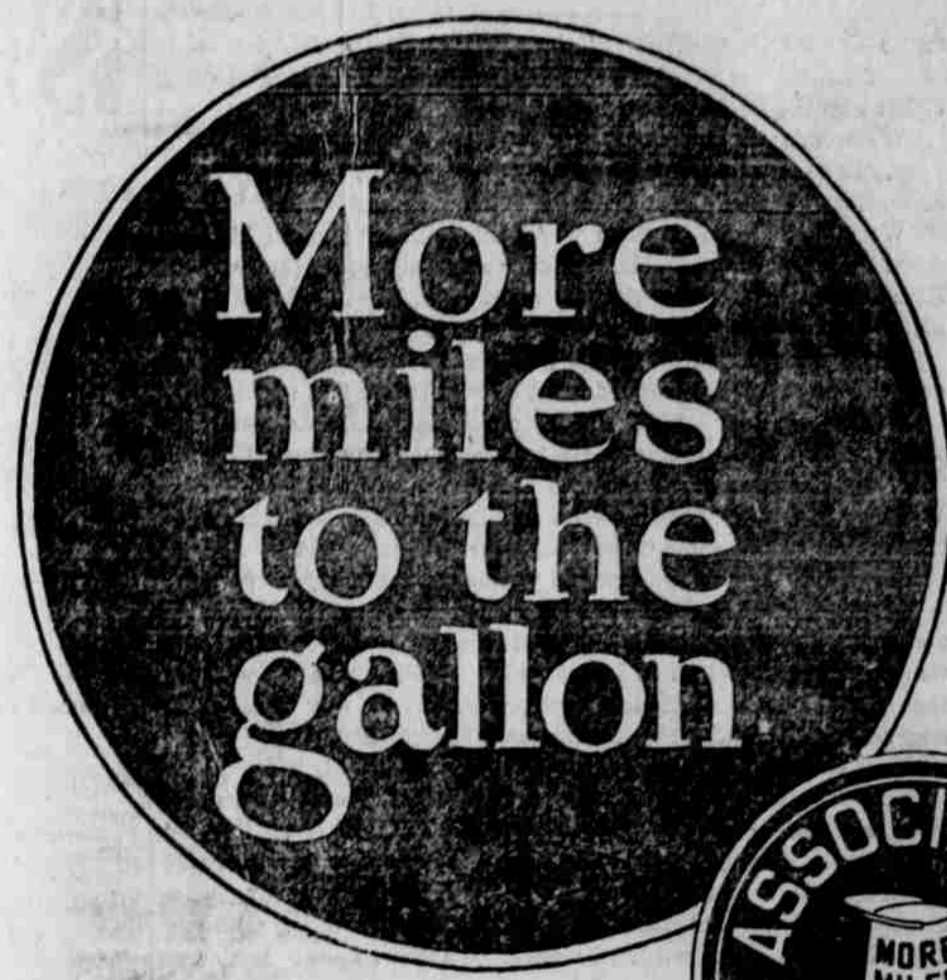
