JOHNNY EVERS THINKS GIANTS HAVE WALKAWAY

NEW YORK, May 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—Johnny Evers, whose opinions on the prospects of a baseball season are not regarded as idle chatter, believes that the Giants will have a walkaway in the National league race and that the American league pennant will go to New York, Cleveland or St. Louis. Evers looks on the Giants of today as the best baseball combination produced in 15 years and equal to the old Chicago Cubs in which he was the pivot link of "Tinker to Evers to Chance." The scrappy second baseman, now a member of the White Sox, who finished a series with the Yankees here yesterday declined to compare the two major leagues, but his estimate on the Giants speaks for itself.

"The Giants," he said, "have everything they need."
With Ruth and Muesel out of the Yankee lineup, it is difficult to appraise at mid-season value the strength of the Yankees, Evers said. It is doubtful in his mind if they will add immensely to the playing strength.

The Giants have a well balanced team, opined Johnny, talking for once without the aid of chewing gum. McGraw has three first class pitchers in

Dempsey Carpenter Matched
LONDON, May 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—An agreement for Georges Carpentier and Jack Dempsey

to meet either in London or Paris before next May, has been reached by Jack Kerns and Francois Desamps, Kerns told the Associated Press today. The two managers agreed to leave the promotion of the event to the parties offering the best terms.

Both Carpentier and Dempsey are to be free to meet other men in the meantime, but a defeat for either prior to the time set for the Dempsey-Carpentier match would cancel the agreement.

Jess Is Through
LOS ANGELES, May 12.—Jess Willard, heavyweight boxer, mentioned in recent dispatches from Paris as

a possible early opponent for Jack Dempsey, is not seeking a return match with the world's champion, according to a statement attributed to Willard today by a local newspaper. Willard, who won the championship from Jack Johnson and lost it to Dempsey, arrived here some time yesterday but secluded himself. The newspaper story quotes Willard as having said that his private business was keeping him on the jump and that he did not have time to give the ring game serious thought.

Lampman Returns From Far East, Says No Time for Fair

Ben Hur Lampman, who started with Julius L. Meyer on his trip around the world on a mission of making known Portland's plans for the exposition in 1925, returned to his home here Wednesday, having left the Meier party at Shanghai. Lampman, as a newspaper man, made the trip on behalf of the four Portland newspapers and wrote articles descriptive of the trip and of the progress the exposition spirit was making in the Orient.

Lampman said conditions in Japan and China were anything but satisfactory, from the standpoint of participation in the fair.

His decision to return to America was based chiefly upon this fact, as he felt that to continue would mean little more than a personal pleasure trip, and he felt it would be unfair to the Portland papers to continue on that basis.

Meier continued on his way through Asia and Europe, and will complete his program of promoting interest in the exposition, Lampman said. It is expected that the Meier party will return to Portland some time in August.—Portland Journal.

The Daily Bank Robbery

SAVANNAH, Ga., May 12.—John Vardeman, alias J. W. Hollis, and Bertha Fern Vardeman have made a "clean breast" of the robbery of the Chase National bank in New York City of \$500,000 in securities, according to detectives who have been working here on the case. They added that the \$300,000 worth of bonds still missing probably would be recovered within a few hours.

The robbery of \$500,000 worth of Liberty bonds from the Chase National bank of New York has occupied the attention of detectives since April 17.

A country-wide search led operatives to Savannah where the Vardeman family recently established. Mahoney Hirsch, a jeweler, arrested on suspicion of having aided in the disposition of the bonds was released from jail in New York Friday under \$30,000 bail. He declares his innocence on the ground that the woman with whom he negotiated was known as Mrs. LaBlanche, who had received

the bonds from a wealthy New Yorker to aid in establishing a theatrical venture.

RETAIL PRICE CLOTHING HAS DROPPED 42 PER CENT

CHICAGO, May 12.—Retail clothing prices have dropped 42 per cent since

July, 1920, and a further decline is expected, according to the National Industrial conference board which has made a survey of the clothing industry.

Between November, 1921 and March 1922, the average cost of clothing decreased five percent, the report says.
