LEAGUE CONSIDERS **ALBANIA MANDATE** ITALIANS OBJECT

League of Nations protectorate for matter of arbitration, both having use telephone. Albania, was suddenly blocked at this morning's public session of the council of the league when Marquis Imperials of Italy informed the members, just before the opening that Italy could not consent to such dras tic supervision of the affairs of Albeing assured that Italy's vital interests in that country would be safe-

The members hurriedly conferred and decided to postpone consideration of the subject a few days in the hope of meeting the Rullan objection. In pointing out the need of supervision of Albania by the league, the Earl of Balfour said the league's work had already pacified a corner of Europe which had been rapidly becoming a scandal and the potential source of another war. No other ma-chinery could have carried out this work, he declared, and the league by its intervention had disposed of a question which had been agitating the world since 1913.

The League of Nations, added Lord Balfour, had entirely cleared Albania of Siberian troops and the country had been placed in a position, when with the aid of foreign capital she could take her place along with the nations of the earth.
