

# MERCHANTS MAY BE CALLED ON TO FINANCE FAIR

As the Jackson County Fair association has no cash with which to pay for the preliminary expenses of the fair this fall, the Pendleton plan for the advance sale of tickets to the merchants of the various communities of the county is now being considered.

This plan is to have the merchants buy admittance tickets, which they will offer for sale in their place of business during the fair. It is preferred to have those who intend to visit the fair buy their tickets in the communities near which they live in order to avoid delay and congestion at the entrance gates.

In case the plan is adopted, the merchants would be provided with placards advising people to buy their tickets at their place of business and merchants will then be reimbursed for the cash advanced to pay for advertising and many other preliminary expenses which the fair association is called upon to spend before the opening date.

A conservative estimate of attendance has been made for the four days at the fair and the number has been placed at 30,000. With the attractions being planned and with the effort to be made by the Chamber of Commerce at Ashland, there will be at least 3000 automobiles that enter the gates on both Ashland and Medford days. The attendance on each of these days will be 12,000 persons.

With such a prospect of attendance the merchants should not hesitate to buy admittance tickets to the value of \$2,500. The entire plan is not perfected and directors of the association would welcome suggestions from merchants on a better method to finance the fair this year.

The fair dates are September 13, 14, 15 and 16th. All entries should be made on the 12th. Owners of livestock are requested to begin selecting the stock now which they intend to exhibit.
