We missed Mrs. Carl Esch from her class in our Sunday school and inquiring of her husband the cause of her absence learned that she had just brought off 500 little chicks and had to stay and care for them, so the reader will see that everybody in this section is not asleep, but Eagle Point is waking up and expects to be up with the foremost.
