SOVIET PARTY IS NOW EXCLUSIVE AS N. YORK CLUB

MOSCOW—The communist party—the proletarian oligarchy which controls the Russian soviet government—is becoming more and more a closed corporation, as difficult of entrance as the most exclusive American club, or the higher degrees of the most secret lodges.

The party was reduced last year to about 500,000 members by a rigid culling out process under which nearly 150,000 persons were expelled for various reasons. New rules for admission of new members to the party, just adopted by the 11th All-Russian communist congress, make it exceedingly difficult for any persons, even the working men themselves, to enter it.

Three categories of candidates are provided. The first, including actual workers and Red army soldiers who are of "workmen's origin" may enter the party by decision of local committees upon the recommendation of three members of three years' party experience, but must serve a period of six months probation before being allowed to participate actively in party affairs.

The candidates from the second category, peasants and small shop or home workers who do not themselves exploit the labor of others, are admitted on the same general conditions, providing the district party committees approve of them and they serve one year of probation.

The third category, including other persons, even those who have previously been members of other parties, must receive the recommendation of five members of five years' standing, be approved by the district committees and serve two years' probation.

As all of the very high posts in the Russian government are held by communists and most of the more important subordinate positions are given only to party men, the provisions of this last category would serve to bar other persons, even those desiring now to enter the party, from participation in the upper circles of the government.

Persons joining the communist party must bind themselves to observe strict discipline and to model their personal lives along communistic idealistic principles. They must forewear religion, promise not to drink in public places and to be extremely moderate in consumption of any intoxicants anywhere. They are not to amass wealth, nor to exploit the labor of others.

RAISE IN PARCEL POST RATES CONTEMPLATED

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Postmaster General Work announced today that in view of the fact that increased costs of handling parcel post mail necessitates a corresponding advance in parcel post rates.

He was writing to a large number of parcel post users to get their views on proposed changes.

Changes which have been suggested, Dr. Work said, included proposals to fix a service charge of one or two cents on each parcel mailed, regardless of weight or zone, and to readjust all by weight and zone.

The postmaster general pointed out there had been practically no change in parcel post rates since the service was inaugurated in 1913, although the cost of handling the service amounted to \$300,000,000 more in 1921 than in the year it was started.

Columbia River Rising
HOOD RIVER, Ore., May 15.—A rapid rise in the Columbia river has been noticed since Saturday and rivermen declare a heavy rise may be expected during the next ten days if the weather continues warm. Backwater now covers the lowlands near the city.

News Summary of Last Night

SALT LAKE—Four officers of the American Masonic federation, an organization alleged to have sold spurious Masonic degrees throughout the country, were found guilty by a jury in the United States district court of charges alleging the use of the mails to defraud.

WASHINGTON—America's only course toward Russia is to decline relationship until confidence is restored in the rights of property and the sanctity of contract in that country, Secretary Hoover declared in an address before the United States section of the international chamber of commerce.

WASHINGTON—The state department made public the text of a message to Ambassador Child at Genoa declining the invitation to participate in the new European economic conference at The Hague.

LOS ANGELES—W. S. Coburn, grand goffin of the Pacific domain of the Ku Klux Klan, is on the way to Atlanta, Ga., to confer with Imperial Wizard Joseph W. Simmons, it was admitted by Coburn's attorney, who is handling the cases of several klansmen in connection with the recent Inglewood raid.

FORDNEY BILL TO PROTECT FARMERS

WASHINGTON, May 16.—All products of the farm are on the dutiable list in the McCumber-Fordney tariff bill, Senator Gooding of Idaho, chairman of the republican agricultural-tariff bloc, announced today in the senate.

"If any farm product is on the free list, I do not know what it is," he said. "If we find it, we will put it on the dutiable list if it needs protection."

Senator Gooding asserted that "all this talk about the McCumber bill being framed behind closed doors is without foundation."

The present was the first tariff bill ever framed that gave the farmer a square deal he said.

Cuban Chess Expert Wins.
PARIS, May 16.—Joseph R. Capablanca, the Cuban chess expert today won 28 games, lost one and drew one, playing simultaneously against 49 of the best chess players in Paris. The only one to beat the champion was Jean Pape, an elderly antiquary.
