FAMILY DISPUTE RESULTS DEATH VERNON FARMER

MOUNT VERNON, Wash., May 16.—P. D. Morris, 58, a farmer residing near here is dead and his wife and two of his brothers are suffering from bullet wounds as a result of a family dispute which occurred shortly before noon today on a division of property. Mrs. P. D. Morris is believed to have been fatally wounded and Ed Morris, who started the shooting, is suffering from two bullet wounds, one inflicted by himself and the other said to have been inflicted by George, another brother. George also was wounded in the head but not seriously.

According to the officers Ed, after demanding a settlement from P. D. Morris, who was sitting on the porch at the ranch house, opened fire with a .38 caliber revolver after his brother said he was not financially able to make a division. Then, without warning, he fired three shots at Mrs. Morris who was nearby, inflicting one wound in the breast and two in the arms. George, who heard the shots fired, ran to the house and is said to have been greeted with a bullet, which entered his head. He then entered the house to get his revolver. Meanwhile Ed had also entered the house and seized a shotgun. Officers said George fired one shot at Ed, wounding him, and the latter fell over on the bed and fired a shot into his own head with a revolver. His condition is said to be serious.

The three brothers lived together on the ranch.

EXPECT CHINA WAR TO RESUME SOON

TIEN TSIN, Hay 16.—(By the Associated Press.) There is a momentary lull in the military operations north of this city, owing to the fact that Wu Pei Fu, victorious in his campaign against Chang Tao-Lin near Peking, has not concentrated sufficient forces in the neighborhood of Kangshan for an attack on Chang's army which is entrenched there. A movement of Wu's troops on a large scale is expected to begin shortly.

Thousands of Fengtien soldiers who were disarmed and some even deprived of their uniforms after their capture in the Peking campaign are embarking for New Chwang (Ying Kow) Manchuria. Among those leaving are about a score of Russians from Manchuria who served as troopers in the Fengtien cavalry. The Chli leaders appear confident that these repatriated soldiers will join Fu's army.

U. S. VALUATION IS SCORED BY CAPPER

WASHINGTON, May 16.—American valuation again was brought into senate discussion of the tariff bill today, Senator Capper, republican, Kansas, chairman of the senate agricultural bloc charging that the "most zealous advocates" of this system desired it because they believed that by it they could "conceal from the American people the extent to which they desire to raise rates."

Bulgaria Kicks Out Wrangel Plotters

SOFIA, May 16.—(By Associated Press.) Several officers who served under General Baron Wrangel in his anti-bolshevik campaigns in south Russia, are charged by the Bulgarian government with organizing an espionage service and preparing for a coup d'etat in conjunction with opposition elements. The Russian general, Shatloff, has been ordered to leave Sofia, two Russian colonels have been arrested and three members of Wrangel's general staff ordered to leave Bulgaria immediately. In addition the Russian refugees and former soldiers throughout the country have been placed under strict regulations.

The Bulgarian communists are strongly supporting the government's action.

LEAGUE NATIONS REFUSES TO TAKE UP RUSS. TANGLE

GENEVA, May 16.—(By Associated Press.) The council of the League of Nations refused today to take up the Russian problem and referred to the Geneva conference the Norwegian government's request for an immediate inquiry by the league into the general situation in Russia and the effect of the famine on economic reconstruction in Europe.

Zionists in all parts of the world have caused the council not to take up the subject of Palestine at its next meeting.

It is regarded as highly improbable, however, that any action looking to confirmation of the British mandate will be taken at this session because of the opposition of the French and Italian quarters.

Dr. Fridtjof Nansen who presented the Norwegian government's request and who is the league's high commissioner for Russian relief, fought hard to prevent the question going to Geneva. He said handing it to Geneva was equivalent to burying it.

Marquis Imperiali of Italy protested this saying he was confident the conference at Geneva would give the question fullest consideration.

Dr. Nansen, however, insisted that the Geneva conference was about to break up, without according to the press reports, having solved the Russian problem.

GAS WELL BLOWS EL DORADO, ARK.

ELDORADO, Ark., May 16.—(By Associated Press.) A crater two hundred feet across was blown out early today at the Wild Murphy gas well, ten miles north of Eldorado and the gas from it and all other craters in the vicinity was ignited. Several smaller craters were fired last night within a radius of 200 yards but the main well, estimated to be making more than 75,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day, did not catch fire until the huge crater was blown out today.

\$150,000,000 Fire New Jersey. PERTH AMBOY, May 16.—The white lead department of the United Lead companies plant here was destroyed by fire early today. The damage was estimated at \$1,500,000.

GIVE BABIES DOPE SO MOTHERS CAN EARN A LIVING

CONSTANTINOPLE.—American residents here are aroused by discovery that scores of refugee children are being kept in "doped" condition by women who make a living day nursing them while their mothers work for bread.

Nearly 1000 of the children have been found in hovels and cellars after having been given a native narcotic solution to keep them quiet. In this city sleeping potions are sold by street criers and the women had resorted to the plan of stupefying the children so that their own work would be uninterrupted.

Led by Mrs. R. S. Emrich of Framingham, Mass., an American near east official, five American women have formed a committee to stop the condition of affairs, which they say is producing drug addicts. Mrs. Be Rayndal of Filmore county, Minn., wife of the American consul general, is chairman of the committee. Two resident representatives of the Jewish Welfare society are members.

A survey by the Massachusetts woman showed that refugee widows, who had been helped to find employment by the relief organization were compelled to leave their children for a small fee a day in the hands of women who herded them in groups of ten to fifteen in cellars and huts. Mrs. Emrich found children sitting stupidly on water soaked dirt floors in danger of developing tuberculosis as well as suffering from drug effects. Their ages ranged from one and a half to four years.

Rooms have been opened by the committee, which is hoping for American contributions through generous people for maintaining a modern place and nurses to care for this new phase of the refugee problem.

BUILD A WORLD CITY BRUSSELS

BRUSSELS.—The striking idea of building an "international city" at the gates of Brussels which was first proposed to King Albert of the Belgians in 1912, has been revived and it is now proposed to erect the city and inaugurate it at the same time as the Brussels International Exposition in 1920.

It is intended that the international city shall be a permanent institution where every country will have a building in which it will display not only its manufactures and products but examples of its art and records of its social progress.
