ROSE SHOW BIG LOCAL ATTRACTION PROSPERITY WEEK

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce realizing that the irrigation development that has taken place and that the opening of the Roseville lumber mill within the next 30 days, together with the opening up of the Pacific and Eastern Railway are three distinct contributing factors to greater prosperity for the valley. They believed that recognition should be given to them during "Prosperity Week" and a committee of the directors was appointed to confer with the committee from the Retail Merchants Bureau regarding same.

As an added attraction during that week, the Greater Medford club is to be asked to conduct a Rose Show for which purpose the board made an appropriation.

The report of a committee which had in charge the budgeting of funds of the Chamber of Commerce was accepted without any alterations. Included in this report was a recommendation that a certain sum of money be placed in a separate fund each month so that cash will be available at all times for publicity purposes.

Expenditures were authorized to maintain the building in a presentable condition, and the construction of three signs along the highway leading into Medford to advise that free road maps and information are available to travelers at the Oregon Tourist and Information Bureau, which has its office at the Medford Chamber of Commerce.

WARM WEATHER LAST FEW DAYS IMPROVES CROPS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 18.—Most crops in the western part of the state are looking well and making rapid progress in spite of the unusually late season, according to the weekly state crop report of the weather bureau here today.

Warmth of the last four days has hastened germination of the barley and oats. Winter wheat and rye while slow in starting are apparently in fair to good condition.

The first of the previous week most injurious in Malheur and Umatilla counties. Reports are conflicting and the full extent of the damage is not yet known.

Low temperatures may reduce the yield of early strawberries on low lands in western districts, but other fruits were too far advanced to be materially affected by the freeze.

Cattle are improving slowly and do not appear to be up to the average for this season of the year.

SANDWICH, England, May 18.—(By Associated Press). Miss Cecil Leitch, British women's open golf champion, and Miss Joyce Wether, English close champion, will compete for the open championship over the Princess course here, both having won their matches in the semi-finals.

Dempsey Returns Soon
NEW YORK, May 18.—Jack Dempsey and his manager, Jack Kearns, will return today to the United States on the Aquitania after a brief trip to Paris, London and Berlin.

While abroad the champion signed an agreement for a return match with Georges Carpentier some time within the next year. Boxing experts profess little faith in the pulling power of the Carpentier match. Harry Wills, negro heavyweight, looks the most formidable of Dempsey's rivals and reports of an offer for a contest between them in Montreal July 1, are coupled with statements that Tex Rickard and other promoters will make them a proposition.

Offers for a bout with Louis Firpo, pride of the Argentine, in Buenos Aires and a possible return match with Bill Brennan, who stayed 12 rounds with Dempsey some time ago, are in prospect.

Great Wrestling Match.
CHICAGO, May 18.—Rivalry for mat honors between Martin Piestina of Chicago and John Pesek of Nebraska still were unsettled today after their second meeting described as one of the most remarkable wrestling matches ever witnessed in Chicago. The bout had been advertised as a ten-finish contest but after three hours and 22 minutes work Tuesday night the big men were nearly exhausted and the match was stopped by the city athletic commission which governs such events. SPECIAL INVESTIGATOR FOR KLAMATH BANK

SALEM, Ore., May 18.—Attorney General Van Winkle, at the request of Governor O'cott, today retained J. P. Kavanaugh, Portland attorney as a special assistant to conduct an investigation into possible violations of the state banking law in connection with the recent closing of the First State and Savings bank at Klamath Falls.

PEAR SITUATION IN CALIFORNIA IS NOT OF THE BEST

All pear growers at the present time begin to inquire into the prospects, not only for pear crops, but for all fruit crops. While it is too soon to determine with any accuracy what the California pear crop prospects are, since no one can tell till the little hardy-formed pears are thru dropping, the present indications are for promising crops in Placer and the Sierra Foothills, in Lake, in Santa Clara and in Contra Costa. When the drop is finished we can tell whether this is correct or not. The final count is when the pears are in the boxes.

In the really big pear district of the Sacramento River, conditions at blooming time were not of the best. Continued cold weather, north winds and frost have affected a considerable number of orchards, particularly young trees of six to ten years old and some of the older trees. Some Sacramento fruit growers say "not over 60 per cent." But it is too soon to tell, conditions varying in different orchards.

As to other fruit crops, there is certainly a material shortage in apricots due to frost and brown rot, with the probability of an unusually light cannery pack. With offers of 25 cents a pound or more for dried apricots, the cannery price will be high, and therefore cannery cannot risk a large pack.

In the eastern states, the Georgia peach crop, which usually comes into competing with the early shipments of pears and plums from California, is estimated by the Georgia Central Railroad as probably not over 6500 cars as against 10,500 last season.

On the face of present indications it looks as if eastern markets, provided the coal strike does not last too long, will take materially larger supplies of California pears. Wages have been reduced, however, and housewives are counting the pennies.

Last year California shipped 4000 cars of pears east. Let us hope that the little pears just formed will stick on the trees despite possible frosts and winds and that we shall have a record season.—Frank Swett, in California Pear Grower.

4:00 A. M. TO 11:00 A. M.

4:00 P. M. TO 11:00 P. M.

MONDAY, WEDNESDAY AND FRIDAY, on the East side of the Streets running North and South, and North side of all Streets running East and West.

TUESDAY, THURSDAY AND SATURDAY, on the West side of all Streets running North and South, and on the South side of all Streets running East and West.

SUNDAY FORENOON, on the East side of all Streets running North and South, and the North side of all Streets running East and West.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON on the West side of all Streets running North and South, and on the South side of all Streets running East and West.
