

USED CLOTHING FOR NEAR EAST READY MAY 24

Plans for the collection of used clothing for the Near East Relief are progressing favorably. A large committee of women have the matter well in hand.

The city will be divided into seven districts. Each district will be canvassed by a member of a motor corps, and the bundles of clothing collected from the homes. Place the bundles on the front porch and the committee will do the rest.

Do not feel you cannot give, because you have already given to some other organization and your things are all gone. If you have only one garment to give, it will be very acceptable.

The collection of clothing will start on Wednesday morning, the 24th, and it is urged that all who have anything to give will plan for it to be taken on that day.

The receiving station will be the Presbyterian chapel, where a committee of women will pack the goods for shipment. Clothing should be clean, even if there are badly worn places, garments can be remodelled at the orphanages, where older girls are trained to do this work. Children's picture books and light, unbreakable toys are asked, for many children are in hospitals, many just learning to play for the first time in their tragic lives.
