GIFFORD PINCHOT COMES BACK.

YES, the Bull Moosers are coming back. The victory of Gifford Pinchot in Pennsylvania, following the victory of Beveridge in Indiana clearly establishes this fact. As a result some impressionable people are foreseeing another split in the Republican party.

Such a conclusion is hardly warranted. Neither Pinchot nor Beveridge made the Harding administration an issue. Neither candidate represented a Republican party revolt. The primary results merely mean that a peaceful change within the Republican party is taking place—a drift from conservative to liberal leadership.

Moreover, it should be remembered that both Pinchot and Beveridge are men of national reputation, of high abilities and attainments, with large and loyal personal followings within their home states. State pride had a great deal to do with their selection. In both cases their opponents were lacking in those personal qualities which appeal to the popular imagination, while the purely partisan appeal, which under other circumstances might have been a handicap, seldom, exerts much influence in a bye election.

Therefore, those who see another Progressive revolt, are depending upon their memories more than their minds. In fact, if there is any revolt it will be from entirely different sources.

The real significance of the Beveridge and Pinchot victories in fact, is this,—the Bull Moose movement is over, and the former leaders of that revival, are now definitely back in the G. O. P. fold, not only as Republicans of good standing, but as leaders of a regenerated party.

This is voting day, when every good citizen should vote if he or she does nothing else.
