LOWER FREIGHT RATES ON PEARS ARE PROBABLE

The traffic department of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association has been notified that a meeting will soon be called by the Transcontinental Freight Bureau for the purpose of an investigation, proposed by C. L. Smith, traffic manager of the association, of the existing rates applying on pears.

Hitherto all varieties of pears have been classed as perishables and shipped under the rate of \$2.08 1/2 per hundred, but late pears are rated as non-perishable as apples, Mr. Smith said, and should receive the rate of \$1.50 per hundred, the same as apples. Mr. Smith has endeavored to get action on this proposed change for some time since, he believes that it is an injustice to the growers of these late varieties to apply a differential of forty-eight cents per hundred, which would otherwise return several thousand dollars annually to the growers of the state.

It is expected that there will be strong opposition to this proposed revision and unless northwest shippers work together, this differential may not be lifted.

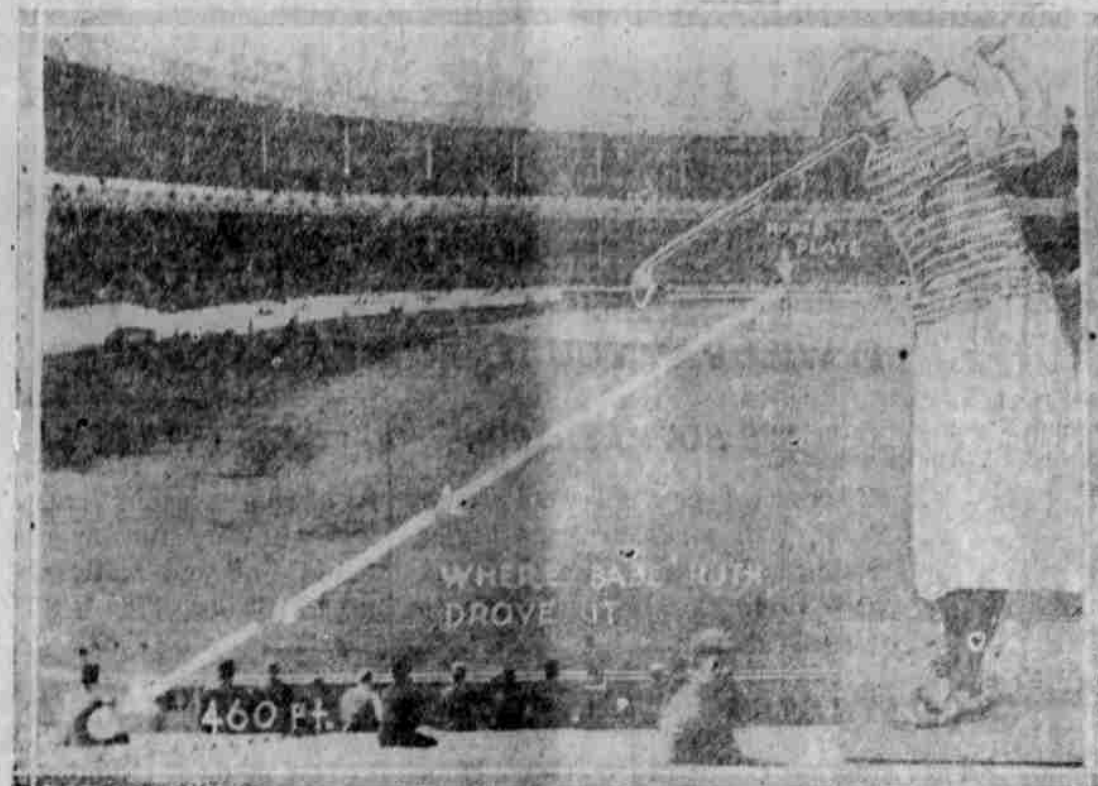

MEX. REVOLUTION NIPPED IN BUD, REBELS DEFEATED

MEXICO CITY, May 19.—(By Associated Press). Secretary of War Serrano, who left hastily on receipt of reports of the sacking of Frontera, Tabasco, by 200 rebels under Jose Serrano, boarded the gunboat Zarazosa at Vera Cruz and is on his way to the scene of the trouble.

A war office statement says Serrano's forces were surprised and defeated this morning at Las Palmas while celebrating their victory and that several of the rebels were killed and others captured. The statement also denies the rumored defection of General Luis Mireles, commanding the federal troops in the state of Tabasco, declaring the government has absolute confidence in him.

It is understood Secretary Serrano has called a war council of all the heads of departments in the Isthmian territory of Tabasco and Chiapas and if necessary will remain at Villa Hermosa until the campaign is well under way against General Carlos Greene, commander of the rebels.

Greene was included in President Obregon's recent order that no leniency be shown to leaders of rebellious movements.

GEN'L. WU PEI FU OUTFLANKS CHANG

TIEN TSIN, May 17.—(By the Associated Press).—General Chang Tso-lin, the Manchurian military governor, has withdrawn his troops from Kaiping and Kuyeh, northeast of Tien Tsin, toward Lwanchow, a few miles further east toward the gulf of Chihli.

Since it was only yesterday that General Chang announced that he intended to hold his positions at Kaiping and Kuyeh, it is surmised here that the flanking movement of General Wu Pei-fu already has begun.

Nine thousand Manchurian troops have now been repatriated from Tien Tsin to the northern part of Manchuria and reports received here state that the presence of these penniless soldiers there is most unwelcome.

Telegraph lines between this city and Manchuria have been interrupted but rumors have filtered through to the effect that General Chang is experiencing trouble in Manchuria.

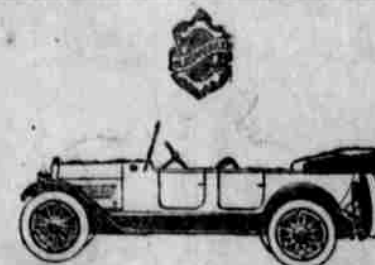
