## RESULT GOVERNOR CONTEST IN DOUBT

### HALL LEADS OLCOTT 658 STATE VOTE

Close Race for Governor With  
Multnomah Near Complete  
and Cow Counties Incom-  
plete—Williams Beats Fith-  
ian—Lead Cut Down in  
Midday Returns.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—3 o'clock  
p. m.—Update gains for Governor H.  
W. Olcott tabulated this afternoon cut  
down somewhat the lead of Charles  
Hall for the republican nomination for  
governor. Figures from 422 out of 426  
precincts in Multnomah county, com-  
bined with latest returns from thirty  
two counties out of thirty-six in the  
state gave Hall 27,703; Olcott 27,045.  
Multnomah's share in these figures  
were: Hall 19,356; Olcott 18,418.

Counties from which no returns have  
been received are Grant, Lake and  
Harney with a total of 4723 registered  
republican voters.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—With  
returns from 34 of the 36 counties of  
the state reported early this after-  
noon, the race for the republican  
nomination for governor stood: Hall  
34,799; Olcott 33,662, a lead for Hall  
of 1136. This included 414 precincts  
out of 426 in Multnomah county and  
incomplete returns from 52 other  
counties out of 36 in the state. Multi-  
nomah gave Hall 18,705, upstate 16-  
694. Multnomah gave Olcott 17,820,  
upstate 15,843.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—(By  
the Associated Press.)—Charles Hall,  
state senator of Coos county, main-  
tained his lead over Governor Ben Ol-  
cott for the republican nomination  
when additional state returns from  
29 counties were tabulated today to-  
gether with complete returns from  
313 precincts out of 426 in Multnomah  
county. The figures: Hall 27-  
499; Olcott 25,562.

Multnomah gave Hall 14,351 and  
upstate counties 13,139; Olcott polled  
13,334 in Multnomah and 12,223 up-  
state.

SALEM, Ore., May 20.—Thirty-  
four complete precincts out of 75 in  
Marion county give:

For governor—Hall 1288; Olcott,  
1579; Williams 2249.

State treasurer—Hoff 1968; Ryan  
2127.

State Treasurer O. P. Hoff main-  
tained a lead this morning over Thos.  
F. Ryan for the republican nomina-  
tion for state treasurer, Hoff having  
21,512 and Ryan 20,228.

For republican national commit-  
tee-man which figured in one of the hot-  
test fights of the campaign, Ralph E.  
Williams, incumbent, had 21,396 and  
O. H. Fithian 18,126.

In the first congressional district  
Representative W. C. Hawley had  
9728; A. W. Norblad, state senator  
from Clatsop county 6651, and E. A.  
Fisher of Washington county, 3217.

Representative N. J. Sinnott had a  
lead in the second district over James  
H. Gwinn of Pendleton, the figures  
being 4284 to 3062.

In the third district, which com-  
prises Multnomah county, Representa-  
tive C. N. McArthur, who had been the  
target of attacks by opponents  
who charged he had failed to sup-  
port soldier bonus legislation, was  
leading on the basis of complete re-  
turns from 170 precincts early today.  
The figures were McArthur 5813.

### ELECT HAWLEY, M'ARTHUR AND SINNOTT AGAIN

Oregon Returns Old Congress-  
man—Two Races Close—  
Recall Carries Two to One  
1200 Lead for Sinnott, and  
508 for McArthur.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—(By  
the Associated Press.)—Oregon's  
three congressmen appear to have  
been renominated on the face of re-  
turns available today. In the first  
district Representative W. C. Hawley  
had 10,429, A. W. Norblad 7482,  
Earl E. Fisher 5601. Nomination is  
equivalent to election for there is no  
democratic candidate in this district.  
Representative N. J. Sinnott had  
4224 in the second district, as against  
3144 for his opponent, James H.  
Gwinn of Pendleton. The winner will  
run against James Harvey Graham  
of Baker who was unopposed for the  
democratic nomination in this district.

Representative C. N. McArthur  
was maintaining a lead in the third  
district having 11,167 to 10,656 for  
Franklin P. Korell, 7815 for Mau-  
rice Crumpacker and 1742 for San-  
field MacDonald. Elton Watkins was  
running ahead in a field of three  
candidates for the democratic nomina-  
tion in this district.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—In  
their first statewide exercise of the  
far-famed Oregon recall, the citizens  
of the commonwealth voted by more  
than two to one yesterday that two  
members of the public service com-  
mission should be recalled. The recall  
movement was due to feeling  
caused by the action of the commis-  
sion in approving a 30 per cent in-  
crease in telephone rates.

Fred A. Williams, commissioner  
has apparently lost to T. M. Kerrigan  
by a vote of slightly greater than  
2 to 1.

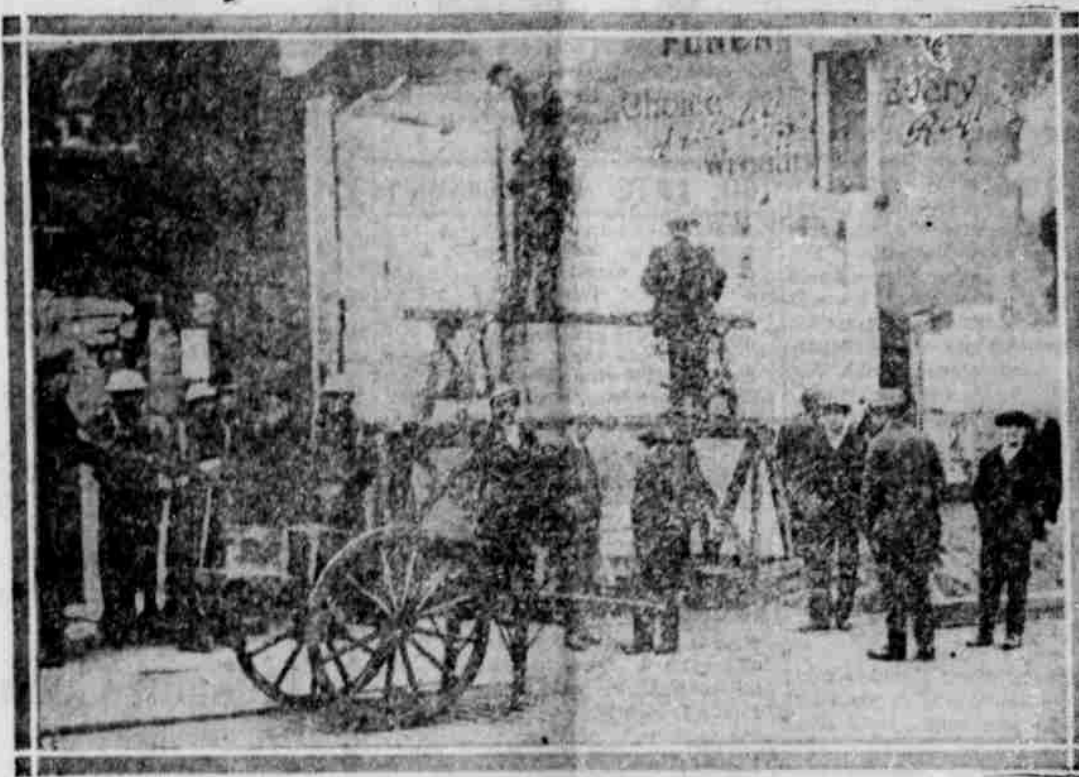
Fred G. Buchtel, commissioner,  
leading Newton McCoy in the returns  
from the state, but McCoy has de-  
feated him badly in Multnomah  
county on the face of returns which  
are incomplete for 29 counties and  
complete for 361 precincts complete  
in Multnomah county.

In 29 counties incomplete and 361  
precincts complete from Multnomah  
county the vote stands: To recall  
Buchtel, yes 30,977; no 16,292. To  
recall Williams, yes 33,169; no,  
17,432.

624; McCoy 14,049; Ostrander 7867.  
The vote on new commissioner to  
succeed Williams stands: Williams

### ULSTER GRIPPED BY BIGOT WAR, MURDER, ARSON

Protestants Avowing Faith  
Shot; Catholic Killed in Re-  
prisal—Sinn Fein Capture  
Fort—Mansion Attacked—  
Rumor of Agreement.

BELFAST, May 20.—(By the As-  
sociated Press.)—Murder and arson  
inspired by religious prejudice, con-  
tinued to terrify Ulster today.

Reports of the number of deaths  
in yesterday's shootings in Belfast  
vary from five to eight, while a dozen  
or more persons were wounded.  
Damage caused by incendiary fires  
aggregated many thousands of  
pounds.

Three men were shot on avowing  
themselves protestants died during  
the night. Two men who today  
entered the saw mills in York street  
area, inquired the religion of the  
various workers, and shot dead a Cath-  
olic, John Connolly, apparently in re-  
prisal for a similar shooting of a  
protestant yesterday.

Shanes castle, the county Antrim  
home of Lord O'Neill, whose son is  
speaker of the Ulster house of com-  
mons was burned today. The care-  
taker was wounded. Lord O'Neill,  
who is 83 years old, and Lady O'Neill  
were rescued.

DUBLIN, May 20.—Dispatches  
from northern Ireland say that Sinn  
Fein forces have captured the police  
barracks at Glenarm, Martinsdown,  
Carnlough and Cushindale, all in  
county Antrim.

The garrison at Martinsdown bar-  
racks put up a stiff fight and held  
off the raiders until its last cartridge  
was exhausted. The bank at Glenarm  
was captured in addition to the bar-  
racks.

ROSCRE, Tipperary, May 20.—  
Fifty men attacked a mansion here  
today and after binding and blind-  
folding the servants sprinkled oil  
about, set fire to the place and de-  
parted, firing shots through the win-  
dows. The servants succeeded in  
freeing themselves and after a long  
struggle extinguished the fire, saving  
the mansion.

DUBLIN, May 20.—(By the As-  
sociated Press.)—Strong rumors were  
current here this afternoon that an  
agreement had been reached between  
Michael Collins, head of the provision-  
al government, and Eamon De  
Valera, the republican leader. The  
rumors began circulating when at  
3:55 o'clock this afternoon the Daily  
Express had not resumed its sessions.

### FILM STAR IS ARRESTED ON BIGAMY CLAIM

Rudolph Valentino Held for  
Marriage in Mexico to Win-  
nifred Hudnut—Nazimova  
at Bridal Party—Actor  
After Bail of \$10,000.

LOS ANGELES, May 20.—A \$10,000  
bail bond for Valentino's release was  
later deposited with Justice Bowser.  
The bondsmen were Miss June Mathis,  
scenario writer; George Melford, di-  
rector at the Lasky studio, who has  
directed Valentino in several of his  
pictures and Thomas Meighan, well  
known motion picture actor.

LOS ANGELES, May 20.—A  
charge of bigamy was placed against  
Dodolph Valentino, screen actor, at  
the district attorney's office with the  
issuance of a felony complaint follow-  
ing the Hollywood actor's marriage  
last Saturday in Mexico to Miss  
Winifred Hudnut, also known as  
Natcha Rambova, while he was leg-  
ally married to Jean Ackert, a movie ac-  
tress.

Valentino was taken before Jus-  
tice Bowser and pleaded not guilty to  
the charge of bigamy growing out of  
his marriage in Mexico, Mexico,  
Saturday to Winifred Hudnut, known  
also as Natcha Rambova, while he  
was legally married to Jean Ackert,  
actress in whose divorce case only  
an interlocutory decree was handed  
down last January.

Attorneys for the motion picture  
actor announced that he had not com-  
pleted arrangements to furnish bail  
of \$10,000. He was permitted to  
leave court in custody of a deputy  
sheriff and his attorney and make an  
effort to arrange bail to obtain release  
from arrest.

The complaint was issued today  
following receipt of information from  
detectives sent by the district attor-  
ney to make an investigation in the  
Imperial Valley and Mexico into the  
marriage and honeymoon of Valen-  
tino and his second bride. These de-  
tectives, it was announced, interview-  
ed the Mexican judge who performed  
the ceremony and arranged for send-  
ing of certified copies of the mar-  
riage return to Los Angeles.

The detectives also reported that  
investigation at Palm Springs, a re-  
sort at the head of the Imperial Val-  
ley, revealed that a bridal party was  
held there Tuesday night when Val-  
entino and the bride were entertained  
by a number of motion picture people  
of Hollywood. It was reported that  
Mme. Nazimova was present at the  
party.

### Jealous Groom Kills Self and His Bride

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May  
20.—George Scroggie, salesman,  
24 years of age, shot and fatally  
wounded his wife, Ruth, aged 24  
here about eight o'clock this morn-  
ing and then turned the gun on  
himself, the bullet penetrating  
the heart. The man died shortly  
after the arrival of police officers,  
while the woman is lying at  
death's door at a local hospital.  
The couple had been married two  
weeks, according to statements  
made by them to local people.  
They came here from Lewiston,  
Idaho. Jealousy is believed to be  
the cause of Scroggie's act.

### OLCOTT DEFEATS HALL IN CITY BY SMALL VOTE

Only 20 Votes Separate Can-  
didates for Governor On  
Unofficial Count Complete  
in Medford—So-Called K.  
K. Ticket Wins and Loses

Governor Olcott carried Medford  
by 20 votes the unofficial totals for  
Medford complete giving Olcott 587  
and Hall 567.

On the other state offices in the  
city the so-called Ku Klux Klan ticket  
put over Daisiel for state labor com-  
missioner by eight votes, the totals  
standing Daisiel 538 and Gram 530,  
while Thiehoff also endorsed by the  
K. K. K. for the public service com-  
mission polled 501 votes to 303 for  
Campbell, anti-Ku Klux Klan and  
218 for Layman also anti Ku Klux.

On the other hand the candidate  
for state treasurer, endorsed by the  
K. K. K. was defeated by Ryan in  
Medford by a vote of 620 to 562, a  
majority of 58, while Fithian endor-  
sed by the K. K. K. for republican  
state committeeman was defeated by  
Ralph Williams by 189 votes, the to-  
tals standing for Fithian 454, and for  
Williams 643.

The recall of Williams and Buchtel  
of the public service commission was  
lost in Medford and both men were  
endorsed by comfortable majorities.  
Hawley, the old reliable, as usual  
showed his tail to all pursuers, in  
Medford, with a vote of 592 to 396  
for Norblad of Astoria and 169 for  
Fisher.

On the county ticket, Gus Newbury  
for circuit judge, who took a public  
stand against the K. K. K., was de-  
cisively beaten in Medford, the final  
count being, for Newbury 363, for  
Thomas 874, a majority for Thomas  
of 511.

Delbert Fehl, who also publicly op-  
posed the K. K. K. was low man for  
the state legislature, with Cowgill  
who took no public stand on the ques-  
tion leading the ticket, with 735  
votes, Carlin, who took no public  
stand on the question, but was not as  
far as known endorsed by the K. K.  
K., 673, and Fehl 375.

In the county commissioner race, in  
which the K. K. K. controversy did  
not enter, Alford of Phoenix, ran like  
a scared rabbit against Tom Simpson  
of Ashland, the complete Medford  
vote being, Alford 735 and Simpson  
307, a majority of 428.
