

FRANCE MAY ACT ALONE ON GERMAN DEBT

Endeavor to Come to Understanding With Allies First—Lloyd George to Get Partisan Ovation On Return From Genoa—Delegates Desert for Homes.

PARIS, May 20.—France, declared Premier Poincare today, "will endeavor to come to an understanding with the allies regarding the action to be taken against Germany if she defaults in payments of her reparations but if France is unable to secure an agreement she will insist on her right to act separately."

The premier said such action would be taken under those clauses of the treaty of Versailles, which give the allies, in case of default by Germany, the power to take measures such as economic and financial reprisals "and in general such other measures as the respective governments may determine to be necessary in the circumstances."

M. Poincare made his statement in replying to an inquiry by M. Klotz, former minister of finance, with regard to declarations recently made by Austen Chamberlain, government leader in the British house of commons on the question of allied action in case of a German default.

LONDON, May 20.—(By Associated Press). There is every prospect that the public welcome organized for Prime Minister Lloyd George on his arrival from the Genoa conference tonight will be memorable. It will, however, apparently be a partisan and not a national welcome. Today's editorials on the breakup of the conference are significant as bearing upon the prime minister's position. On one hand he is adversely criticized for his farewell address at Genoa and for the greater part of his public conduct there and on the other hand he is praised for his courage and resourcefulness in the face of immense difficulties.

As for the conference itself, even its strongest apologists do not claim that it has been a success but look to the coming meeting at The Hague for a sequel of real value. Its enemies have hardly a single good word for it, especially those who from the first opposed admission of the soviet delegates to the council table. These pronounce it a dismal failure and welcome its adjournment.

GENOA, May 20.—(By Associated Press). Genoa today was rapidly being deserted by the delegates who for six weeks have been participating in the discussions of the economic conference which adjourned yesterday after having provided for the continuation at The Hague next month of its efforts to put European reconstruction on a more solid basis.

Prime Minister Lloyd George of Great Britain, hurried away to London last night, expressing optimism over the future, even though the Genoa

gathering had not accomplished everything he had hoped for.

The German and French delegations were the principal departures this morning. Both were bidden farewell at the railway station by Premier Facta and Foreign Minister Schanzer of Italy. The motor cars of the departing delegations were filled with flowers.

Foreign Minister Tchitcherin of Russia and his delegation remained here today. Tonight they will give a farewell dinner in honor of Signors Facta and Schanzer.

MACK DENIES HEARST HIS N. Y. CANDIDATE

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 20.—Norman E. Mack, former chairman of the democratic national committee, authorized a statement that he had not come out for William R. Hearst for governor of New York and Alfred E. Smith for senator.

"I have made no statement of any kind on candidates for senator and governor of New York and I do not intend to make any statement," Mr. Mack said.

Ruth wasn't at home when the good news came. The switchboard operator at his hotel said he'd gone to the Polo Grounds "to practice knocking home runs over the grandstand."

CHICAGO, May 20.—(By Associated Press). Babe Ruth and Bob Meusel of the New York Yankees were reinstated by Baseball Commissioner Landis today.

The home run king now is eligible to start his drive for 1922 slugging honors in this afternoon's game with the St. Louis Browns at New York.

The telegrams from Ruth and Meusel asking re-instatement were received at the commissioner's office about 8:50 a. m. The judge was not there but his secretary, Leslie O'Connor, had received his instructions last night and promptly sent telegrams to Ruth and Meusel reading as follows:

"Your re-instatement application granted effective immediately.

(Signed) "K. M. Landis."

A third telegram was sent Umpires

Chill and Owens reading:

"Ruth and Meusel re-instatement effective immediately. Eligible for today's game." (Signed) "K. M. Landis."

Bill Pierce's application was received a few minutes later and he also was re-instatement.

His telegram follows:

"I hereby make application for re-instatement to enable me to pitch a game today, May 20. Kindly wire."

The applications for re-instatement from Ruth and Meusel were identical. They read as follows:

"I hereby respectfully apply for immediate re-instatement to enable me to play in the game here today, Saturday, May 20."

The three were suspended last fall when they violated the major league rule by playing pool season games. This rule has been in effect for some time and as a result of the Ruth case there has been considerable talk of changing it. The rule applies only to players in world's series.

The rule was not made by Judge Landis, his action being simply the enforcement of an already existing law.

Small Vote Cast.

About thirty per cent of the registered vote was cast in Medford, the rainy day being held chiefly responsible. The total registered vote in Medford is nearly 3000, the actual total being 2996. Only about 1200 votes were polled in the city. As predicted by The Mail Tribune, with the K. K. K. vote out in force, the opposition divided and only a small part of it voting at all, the nomination of Hall would be almost a certainty. Most political experts were agreed that if Governor Olcott had not taken his stand against the K. K. K. and thus secured the normal Bean and Patterson support himself, Hall would have had a walkover.

Figures on the recall of Public Service Commissioner Fred Williams from 215 Multnomah precincts and 29 counties were: Yes, 23,339; no, 12,178. T. M. Kerrigan was leading for Williams' position. Williams, whose term expires next January, was not a candidate for re-election, the recall being aimed to oust him for the remainder of this year.

The recall movement was started as a result of the action of the public service commission in granting an increase in telephone rates averaging 30 per cent, and confirming the advance after an extended public hearing.

The recall vote against Fred G. Buchtel was from Multnomah county, the upstate vote being close. The vote on candidates to replace Buchtel was Newton of Polk county, 5,393; Adjutant General George A. White, 5,090.

Of Hall's total of 19,110 in this tabulation Multnomah county gave 7674 and outside counties 11,436; Multnomah gave Olcott 7020, outside counties, 10,943; McCoy, 7,851; Buchtel, 6,388; Edward Ostrander, 4,206.

For the position of public service commissioner vacant next January the vote stood: J. R. Thiehoff, 7,945; T. G. Campbell, 5,477; F. B. Layman, 2,331.

For state labor commissioner the vote was W. J. Dalzell, 8,228; C. H. Gram, incumbent, 7,257.

Walter M. Pierce is leading for the democratic nomination for governor with 7553 votes in thirty counties incomplete, including 209 precincts complete in Multnomah county. H. G. Starkweather was second with 2,138. Webster Holmes had 589 and Will E. Purdy, 353.

J. W. Morrow was leading on the basis of incomplete returns from thirty counties including Multnomah, for the office of democratic national committeeman. Will R. King was a close second. King's vote was 3,064 and Morrow's 3,209.

Elton Watkins was leading for the democratic nomination for congress from the third district (Multnomah). His vote in 208 precincts complete is 1,600 to 1,251 for Robert A. Miller and 943 for Robert G. Duncan.

An odd coincidence gave Lee and Bean a tie in the republican gubernatorial race on the tabulations this morning. The figures were Lee in Multnomah county 869, outside counties 524, total 893. Bean, Multnomah, 175, outside 718, total 893.

ASTORIA, Ore., May 19.—Returns from 20 Clatsop county precincts give for representative congress first district, Hawley 341; Norblad 1750; for republican nomination for governor, Hall 1051; Olcott 857.

MARSHFIELD, May 19.—Hall, 1100; Olcott 325. Hawley 293; Fisher 137; Norblad 335.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—The other candidates for the republican nomination for governor are far in the rear. L. L. Patterson and Adjutant General White were contending for the third. The totals for Lee and Bean were small with doubt as to which would finish last. The close of the campaign was featured by an attack by Governor Ben W. Olcott upon the Ku Klux Klan and political observers believed this development had an important effect upon the voting. Support of Hall through the Oregon Federation of patriotic societies circulates the state with a list of candidates with Hall at the head.
