The trial of Lloyd Elwood, charged with manslaughter as a result of an auto accident on the Pacific highway last December was begun this morning with Prosecutor Rawles Moore representing the state, and Attorney Porter J. Neff the defense. The entire morning was devoted to the work of examining the jury.

Funeral services were held today in Ashland over Martha V. Porter, wife of Frank E. Porter, who committed suicide by hanging near her home at Deter, Ore., about four miles south of Ashland last Thursday forenoon. She was aged 31 years, and had made three separate attempts to end her life by hanging, it is said. Mr. Porter left Thursday morning to take their little girl to school. 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CITIZENS PROTEST AGAINST CIRCUS MEMORIAL DAY

Such a loud protest is being made by citizens generally of Medford and by the members of the O. A. R., W. R. C., the American Legion and other patriotic societies in particular against Howe's Great London Circus and Van Amburg's Wild Animals being permitted to show here on Memorial day, that Mayor Gates and City Recorder M. L. Alford will do their best to have the attraction cancel the Medford date.

If that is not possible, and it probably not unless the city wants to stand a suit for damages, the city council and mayor will stipulate that the circus parade can not be given until after the Memorial day parade and exercises both at the theater and in the city cemetery are over.

Following a conference between the mayor and city recorder this forenoon a telegram was sent to the circus management informing it that there was a big protest over the Memorial day date here and asking that a representative be hurried here for a conference on the matter.

Last week the contract for this date here was signed by the city recorder and the circus advance agent. No city official had noticed that the date fell on Memorial day, else a license contract would not be issued. The advance agent left a check to pay the license fee of \$100.

It is probable that the circus will refuse to cancel the date in Medford, as its full time is booked for weeks ahead. The circus shows at Ashland on May 29, Medford on May 30 and Grants Pass on May 31st. Mayor Gates suggests that in view of the protest the circus might be willing to give only one performance instead of two, and that in the evening, following a late afternoon parade.

The people back of the protest point out that the sacred significance of Memorial day will not only be utterly marred by the appearance of a circus with its regulation late forenoon parade, but that if such a program was allowed to go through it would interfere with the parade and exercises in memory of the dead soldiers.
