NORTH AND SOUTH CHINA MAY JOIN IN PEACE PACT

PEKING, May 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Wu Pei Fu, in control of Peking following his recent victory over Chang Tso Lin, has opened negotiations with Sun Yat Sen, head of the southern government at Canton. This movement, it is believed has brought nearer the unification of the north and south which have been separated almost continuously since the formation of the republic ten years ago.

Dr. Sun is understood to have indicated his willingness to abandon the southern government and unite the country on two conditions. First, that the parliament constituted in the first year of the republic be reassembled and second, that Hsu Shih-Chang, president of the Peking government resign in favor of a chief executive to be elected by the parliament. In other words, Dr. Sun desires that both the Peking and Canton governments be superseded by a regime representing the entire country.

General Wu declared that his only object is to bring about peace and prosperity representing the entire country. General Wu declares that his only object is to bring about peace and prosperity under a united China.

Wu has appealed to the nation, to Sun Yat Sen, president Su Shih-Chang, the newspapers and the public, asking the people to express their will as to what shall be done. He asked for suggestions from all factions and declared that soldiers must no longer control the government.

Professing himself ignorant of politics and disclaiming political ambition he called on the country to decide whether the old or a new parliament shall be summoned to deal with the situation. Sun Yat Sen has not answered, but Wu Pei Fu's adviser in Canton has reported good prospects for a favorable reply.

HARDIN, Manchuria, May 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—The declaration of independence of Manchuria, Mongolia and adjacent regions recently proclaimed by General Chang Tso-Lin, military dictator of Manchuria, is not operative, according to information in the best informed foreign quarters here. The proclamation has been received with indifference and there is no apparent change in the situation here.

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SLAUGHTER HOUSE NOT A NUISANCE EVEN IF ODOROUS

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 23.—Altho "the presence of a slaughter house may not be pleasant to the aesthetic sense," it cannot be considered a public nuisance as long as it is operated by sanitary methods, the supreme court held today. The decision affirmed the judgment of the superior court of Stevens county dismissing the action brought by Robert Hughson and wife against Charles Wingham to restrain the latter from operating a slaughter house on the farm adjoining theirs.

Hughson contended that the location of the slaughter house 300 feet from his dwelling was responsible for offensive odors, the presence of flies and was a menace to the comfort, health and repose of the plaintiffs. The court held today that the evidence tended to show Wingham operated the plant along sanitary lines and Hughson was not entitled to relief.
