ANOTHER FLIGHT AROUND WORLD

LONDON, May 23.—(By Associated Press). In an attempt to fly around the world by air, two British aviators plan to hop off from the flying field at Croydon at noon tomorrow.

The aviators, Major W. T. Blake of the Royal Air Force and Captain Norman MacMillan, expect to complete their trip in two months.

The route lies through France, Italy, Greece, Egypt, Mesopotamia, India, eastern China, Japan, thence via the Aleutian islands to Alaska, through the United States to New York to Newfoundland and across the Atlantic to Greenland and Iceland to Scotland.

The route for the trip was visualized by Sir Ross and Keith Smith of Australia but the latter abandoned his plans when his brother was killed recently in a preparatory flight.

'RED COURAGE'

TO DIVE FROM TOP OF HOTEL MEDFORD AS SHRINE STUNT

There will be big Shrine doings in Medford next Friday, May 26, and one of the featured incidents thereto which can be witnessed by the general public will be a thrilling dive from the roof of the Hotel Medford into a tank of water.

The Shrine of Hiram temple, A. A. O. N. M. S. and visiting Shrine will hold a ceremonial at the Natatorium building beginning at 2 p. m. Candidates from Roseburg, Ashland and Medford will be "among those present." A recess will be declared at 5 p. m. when a big parade will be formed with the line of march from the Natatorium to the Hotel Medford.

Prompt at 5:30 p. m. the big added attraction of the day will come, when Prof. Wilbur Fitzgerald will dive from the top of the hotel building into a tank of water. Prof. Fitzgerald is a member of the St. Louis Athletic club and is known as one of the most spectacular divers in the world today.

Immediately after this thrilling exhibition the Shrine and their ladies will enter the dining room of the hotel for the banquet. Upon completion of the work at the Natatorium the big ceremonial ball will be held. As this is the first ceremonial to be held in Medford for several years the committees in charge are working hard to make it an affair long to be remembered.

NEW STAR ROUTE TO KLAMATH FALLS

That star route daily carrier service between Medford and Klamath Falls, in both directions, which Postmaster Warner has long strived with the post-office department to bring about, goes into effect tomorrow. It will make a difference of 24 hours in the delivery of the ordinary mail between the two cities.

The daily pouch from Medford for Klamath Falls will be made up in time to depart on train 13 leaving here at 9:17 a. m., for handling by the star route carrier. The Ashland postoffice will make up a pouch for Medford for handling by the star route, putting in the mail from Klamath Falls that is brought over the mountains by the daily stage this way, and this pouch will be brought by stage to Medford by 2:30 or 3 p. m. in time to be distributed along with the mail arriving on the northbound passenger train from Portland. No registered mail will be carried by this new star route service.

CRATER HIGH SCHOOL PAPER IS OFF PRESS

A general assembly to which everyone is invited will be held at the high school auditorium tomorrow afternoon at 3:15. The occasion for the holding of the assembly is the distribution of the third edition of the "Crater," the year book of the Medford high school.

The Craters are off the press and will be distributed tomorrow afternoon to those who hold slips entitling them to one. If there is a surplus, disposal will be made to those who have failed to secure slips.

The Crater was first issued by the class of 1920 and Dana M. Davis was the editor of the first edition. The financial burden of publishing the first issue was borne by the senior class and the staff was composed of seniors. Last year, as is the case this year, the entire student body produced the volume which fact should make it superior to the first issue. This is to say that it will undoubtedly be a very creditable production. In 1921, Kenneth Brumhaugh was editor and George Mansfield is the editor of the present issue.

START NEW TUNNEL GOLD RIDGE MINE

Work on a new tunnel, 250 feet long which will cut the vein at a level 100 feet deeper than any of the old workings was started at the Gold Ridge mine this morning.

The Gold Ridge has now been in operation for two years and when running at full capacity with a 5-stamp mill from \$1000 to \$1700 has been the average run for a week, according to report.

The officials of the company anticipate that results will continue to improve with the construction of the new cross cut tunnel.

A meeting of stockholders will be held in the public library at 7:30 p. m., June 24, and officers for the ensuing year will be elected.

Press). The Ardfeis, the national Sinn Fein organization, ratified at its meeting today the agreement reached last week by the factions in the Dail Eireann regarding elections and the composition of the government. After voting its approval the session adjourned.

BELFAST, May 23.—Garrison Tower, the county Antrim mansion of Lord Londonderry, recently converted into a hotel, was burned last night by incendiaries.

DUBLIN, May 23.—Michael Collins, head of the provisional government, in addressing the Ardfeis said the soul of the agreement reached by the Dail last Saturday was that it secured the unity of the nation, enabling Ireland to end the disorder. "If, as has been said, this agreement repeals the Anglo-Irish treaty," said Collins, "we will have to face that in this manner. We have made an agreement which will bring stable conditions to the country and if these stable conditions are not more satisfactory then we must face what these stable conditions will enable us to face."

DUBLIN, May 23.—The wholesale arrest of Sinn Feiners by the Ulster authorities today is regarded in Dublin as an unhappy development for the southerners in favor of conciliation and the opinion was freely expressed that it might result in the strengthening of the republican party, led by Eamon DeValera.

SALEM, Ore., May 23.—Ballot titles for the two measures being initiated by the Oregon tax reduction clubs have been prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle. One of the measures will be known as the "millage tax repeal for the agricultural college and state university." The other measure, if it receives sufficient signatures, will go on the November ballot as "two-thirds vote on public indebtedness at general election only." Its purpose will be "to require a two-thirds majority of all votes cast to adopt any measure for creating or insuring any public debt or issuing any bonds, by the state, district or municipality."

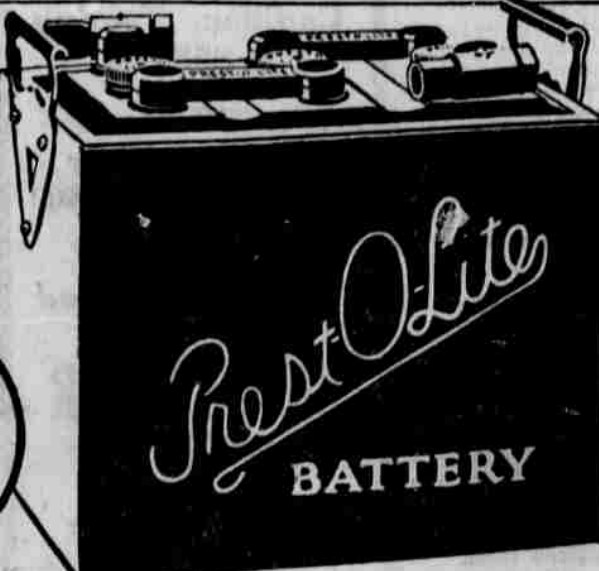
