STATE RESTS IN ELWOOD TRIAL, DEFENSE BEGINS

The state rested and the defense opened this morning in the trial of Lloyd Elwood in the circuit court, charged with manslaughter as the result of an auto accident on the Pacific highway near Voorhies crossing last December, when Fred Hartzel, a traveling salesman of Eugene was killed.

The principal witness at the morning session was J. J. McMahon, who testified to the investigation he conducted following the accident that led to the detention of the defendant, and subsequent indictment. The defense read the testimony McMahon gave at the preliminary hearing, as impeachment of his testimony.

Clark and Paul Walker were called by the state to identify the Dodge car driven by the defendant on the night of the accident. Both failed to answer their subpoenas promptly, and an order was issued by the court forfeiting their pay for attendance at the trial.

The Tuesday afternoon session was devoted to the opening statements to the jury, and the hearings of witnesses who attended the dance at Kingsbury Springs, and arrived at the accident shortly after its occurrence.

The case will be given to the jury in the morning.

The next trial on the docket is that of Florenz Hall, charged with a violation of the prohibition law. This case was continued from the last term of court owing to the failure of his nephew, Mangus Hall, on parole for a similar offense, to appear as a witness.

The next case will be that of R. E. Johnson charged with non-support. Johnson was acquitted last spring on an embezzlement charge.

Following this case Ernest S. (Dud) Wolgamott will be charged on an indictment alleging possession of intoxicating liquor.

WORLD AIR TRIP STARTED

Major Blake has estimated that with a bit of luck, he could get around the world in three months, spending approximately 300 hours in the air.

CROYDON, May 24.—The three aviators, Major Blake, Captain MacMillan and Colonel E. E. Broom, made their start without the attendant plane with photographers and moving picture operators which it had been planned to send with them as far as Athens. It was found impossible to get the second machine ready on time.

Major Blake expressed confidence of making the world tour within ninety days.

"I am the luckiest and proudest man in the world to be able to participate in such a momentous flight," he said. "I am sure it will be entirely successful."

Messages received by Major Blake included one from King George, reading:

"Their majesties wish you all God speed and good luck."

Major Blake bade an affectionate farewell to his wife and their two small daughters just before climbing aboard the airplane.

The expedition carries only 627 pounds of baggage.

Colonel Broom, the scientific member of the party, who has spent many years in Alaska, the Aleutian islands and the Pacific Northwest, said the party would explore Ireland and Greenland if time permitted.

Not all the air experts who watched the preparations for the flight were so optimistic as the leaders. Some thought the DH-9 was too small and frail for such a flight, and expressed misgivings regarding the ability of the aviators to complete the journey.

tempt that we look upon crimes against person and property, the moonshiner and bootlegger will be greater foes against the government than burglars and thieves.

Do Your Duty
"No law violation can be accomplished unless some one knows of it, and if known it is a thrust at the government. The moonshiner and the bootlegger will be finished when each of us does our full duty in reporting law violations. We should be as ready to defend our country when attacked by a foe within as when charged by an enemy from without."

American in Purpose
"The prohibition act is essentially American in its purpose and aim to develop the highest type of American

character and manhood," Roy A. Haynes, United States prohibition commissioner said in an address.

"The years preceding prohibition showed an annual consumption of about 130,000,000 gallons of American-made whiskey. During 1920 there was withdrawn from warehouses on permits approximately 12,500,000 gallons

and in 1921 withdrawals amounted to about 3,500,000 gallons. Withdrawals this year, calculated on the basis of the past four months, will show about 2,000,000 gallons.

"More than 10,000 convictions have been obtained for violation of prohibition laws during the past nine months."
