OLCOTT 480 VOTES AHEAD NEW COUNT

Hall Gains Revised Figures for Multnomah—Arizona Governor Sends Congratulations for 'Stand Against Organized Outlawry'—Gen. White Promises Support.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25.—Governor Ben W. OLCOTT early this afternoon led Charles Hall by 480 votes for the republican nomination for governor as a result of further revision of figures from last Friday's primary.

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—Congratulations upon his nomination as republican candidate for governor as well as upon his "stand against organized outlawry" were received by Governor OLCOTT this morning in a telegram from Governor Thomas E. Campbell of Arizona.

"It is unnecessary for me to say that I am tremendously gratified at the outcome in my favor," wired Governor Campbell, "and I want to take this opportunity to congratulate you not only upon your success in the republican primary but also upon the splendid stand which you have taken against organized outlawry now becoming a menace throughout the nation."

SALEM, Ore., May 25.—Adjutant General George A. White, defeated candidate for governor in the recent primaries today sent a congratulatory letter to Governor Ben W. OLCOTT, pledging his earnest support in the November election.

"I wish to extend to you my hearty congratulations on your nomination," wrote General White, "and to assure you of my earnest support for a united republican victory in November."

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25.—Complete official count of thirty counties of the votes cast in last Friday's primary had been reported early today and complete unofficial count was available from six counties—Curry, Harney, Jefferson, Lake, Multnomah and Wheeler. On this basis the latest figures of the two leading candidates for the republican nomination were: Governor Ben W. OLCOTT, 42,983; Charles Hall, 42,473, a plurality of 510 for OLCOTT. The exact plurality of Governor OLCOTT will not be known until the official returns from all counties have been received. Discrepancies between official and unofficial figures have been found in several counties. Unofficial tabulations of Multnomah county do not agree. The canvass of the Multnomah vote was to begin today.

NOGALES, ARIZ., May 25.—Five men were killed early today in a fire which destroyed about a dozen buildings in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, about sixty miles south of Douglas, Ariz. It was stated in advance received here. The fire, including Donald Marshall, chief electrician for the Cananea Consolidated Copper company and four Mexicans who were crushed to death when a wall of the Lyric theater collapsed while they were fighting the flames.

Two other men were injured. The blaze caused damage estimated at \$250,000. The buildings consumed included two motion picture houses and three mercantile establishments.

Sub-Flapper Latest Dance Hall Problem, Eight Are Arrested

LOS ANGELES, May 25.—Now comes the sub-flapper. She has already brought a problem to the Los Angeles police who have arrested "eight of her."

They describe her as ranging in age from 14 to 17 years, having "flapperish" ambitions, but being "too young to qualify."

The eight arrests came at a dance hall where the sub-flappers were dancing "improperly."

They were officially declared "too young to be out so late."

They were released, but the dance hall proprietor was fined \$25 as it was the second time he had permitted sub-flappers to frequent his establishment. If the sub-flapper is a problem to the police, she is a terror to the dance hall men, said the one fined.

CHARLES CRANE SENTENCED TO 20 YEARS JAIL

French Court in Syria Metes Out Hard Sentence to Chicago Millionaire—Aid to Syrians in Resistance to Mandate Charged.

PARIS, May 25.—(By the Associated Press).—Charles Crane who is reported to have been condemned by a French military court to twenty years' imprisonment is now stopping at a Paris hotel.

When he was asked this afternoon about his condemnation, he refused to submit anything that he was making an effort to do something regarding anything in regard to the Syrian situation.

Mr. Crane said he would not be ready to speak until he reached New York as he "intends working along the same lines in London."

From a traveling companion of Mr. Crane it was learned that he was seeing members of the French chamber and senate regarding the Syrian situation.

CHICAGO, May 25.—Sentence of 20 years in prison on a charge of inciting recent disturbances in French mandate territory in Syria has been meted out to Charles R. Crane of Chicago, by a French military court in Damascus, according to a copyrighted dispatch from Cairo, Egypt, published today in the Chicago Daily News. Mr. Crane was the American ambassador to China during the latter years of the Wilson administration. These reports, according to the Daily News dispatch, "after a hearing by default" (that is in the absence of the accused).

A note to the newspapers, the dispatch continues, adds that the American government has been notified of the verdict.

According to the newspapers the court held that Mr. Crane was equally responsible with numerous Syrians who are serving terms in prison on account of this outbreak.

Reports from Syria are that political prisoners are obliged to sleep on the jail floor and to subsist on dry bread and olives.

REAL DAREDEVIL IS CONGRESSMAN FROM OKLAHOMA

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Willing to take a chance with death to prove himself the only real aerial daredevil of congress, Representative Manuel Herrick, republican, Oklahoma, accepted an aviator's challenge today to join him in a high flight with the brake off.

Herbert J. Fahy, the flyer, had promised the Oklahoma man that he would lose more than a necktie if he agreed to go up.

"You will at your earliest convenience go with me to the war department," Mr. Herrick wrote, "and make the request for a plane and I will back up the request as a congressman, personally."

The Oklahoma house member said he would make no request himself because he "was sure at the department for issuing an order that I must not do any more student flying over the capitol for fear I might fall."

"If you really have any sand in your guts to make good the challenge," Mr. Herrick added, "why, you just money around to my office and we will go to the war department together."

Dropping into his own home-made poetry Herrick gave this:

"If when we fly on high,
"We both should fall to ground and die;
"Then anyone who wants to cry,
"Must rub an onion in his eye."

Advising his challenger further to take out some life insurance Herrick said he had none, adding:

"Personally I don't have to, as I am not leaving any dependents behind. For I have neither father nor mother, sister or brother, uncle or aunt, nephew or niece or cousin even in the forty-third degree. Life to me is not sweet and I don't care two whoops or Ghonnas if you go up a couple of miles and stand her on her nose and let her hit."

ACCOUNTS GONE, AFTER DISMISSAL

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Commissioner of Internal Revenue Blair, in a formal statement today said that more than 300 packets of papers removed from the accounts unit of the revenue bureau after the dismissal, by order of Secretary Mellon, of A. D. Sumner, deputy commissioner of internal revenue, in charge of accounts and C. C. Childs, supervisor of collections had been recovered.

The papers were declared by the commissioner to have been found in the apartment of S. G. Patchell, former chief payroll examiner of the accounts unit. Mr. Patchell, the commissioner said, "has stated that the papers were gathered together by A. D. Sumner, former deputy commissioner and accounts unit were taken away from the accounts unit by him at the request of Dr. Sumner."

Grants Pass Rancher Is Crushed to Death, By Tractor Plow

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 25.—Carl Lathrop, a prominent rancher of this city, was crushed to death between a heavy gas tractor and a gang plow which he was operating on his ranch near here yesterday. He was dead when found by his brother upon his return from town. The rancher's neck was broken and his chest crushed in.

MAY CUT DEBATE ON TARIFF BILL

WASHINGTON, May 25.—A movement said to have the backing of a large number of senators, to change the ancient senate rules permitting unlimited debate, was initiated today at a conference of republican senators.

The decision was reached in a caucus on the tariff measure, now five weeks in the upper house without a single schedule having been approved in final form.

A cloture plan was virtually agreed to but was expected to meet opposition from some republicans in addition to the entire democratic side of the chamber. Senators Borah of Idaho and Johnson of California are leaders among the republican groups which already has declared against the move.

Republican leaders later were warned in the senate by Senator Underwood of Alabama, the democratic leader, that he would resist to his utmost any effort by the majority to apply the "tariff" rule for the passage of the tariff bill.

GERMAN ENVOY VISITS HARDING

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Dr. Otto Wiedfeldt, the new German ambassador to the United States, was received today by President Harding when, accompanied by attaches of the embassy, he presented his credentials as envoy extraordinary of the German republic. He remained with the president only a few minutes. His reception marked the final resumption of relations between the United States and Germany.

ORATORY TO FLOW HOUSE COMMONS

LONDON, May 25.—(By the Associated Press).—Prime minister Lloyd George was prepared today to open the debate in the house of commons on achievements of the Genoa conference. His political opponents also were ready and the premier's replies to his critics after his set address was expected to form the most interesting part of the debate. The public is taking great interest in the event.

4 KILLED, AND 27 WOUNDED BELFAST RIOTS LAST NIGHT

BELFAST, May 25.—(By Associated Press). The total casualties in the disorders which swept Belfast during the night were placed at four dead and twenty-seven wounded today. The wounded included only those cases treated in hospitals. It is unofficially declared the curfew law probably will be extended to include the country districts.

The Carnegie library in the heart of the Falls Road district was set afire last evening. A mob attacked the fire brigade and also the police trying to protect the firemen.

Two men were shot this morning in the Backfalls district. The condition of both is critical.

The Carnegie library was set on fire three times and was badly damaged.

The funeral of W. J. Twaddle, member of the Ulster parliament, who was assassinated Monday, was held today. The services, attended by thousands of persons were imposing. Sir James Craig, the premier, headed the parliamentary delegation.

JURY IN ELWOOD CASE STILL OUT

Up to 2:30 o'clock this afternoon the jury in the Elwood case had been unable to reach a verdict.

The jury in the trial of Lloyd Elwood charged with manslaughter as the result of an auto accident on the Pacific highway last December in which Fred Harzels, a traveling salesman of Eugene, Ore., was killed began his deliberations at 9:30 o'clock this morning, and up to noon had been unable to reach a verdict. At 11 o'clock the jury returned and asked the court for further instructions on the testimony.

Ku Klux Higher Ups Desert Night Riders In L. Angeles Raid

LOS ANGELES, May 25.—Members of the Ku Klux Klan will support klansmen involved in the Inglewood night riding fatal party of April 22, regardless of action by imperial officers of the organization in Atlanta, Ga., it was declared here today by Paul B. De Orr, attorney for the raiders. He said he had been assured of financial support for defense of the night riders to the extent of \$40,000 regardless of the imperial klans officers withdrawing moral and financial support.

ATLANTA, May 25.—The Ku Klux Klan has revoked the commissions of every klansman in California from the king klans down, after a preliminary inquiry into alleged lawlessness in that state.

GENOA CONF. EXPLAINED BY L. GEORGE

British Premier Again Faces Critics in Parliament and Justifies Course at Conference—Greeted With Loud Cheers—Danger German Russian Entente Shown.

LONDON, May 25.—(By the Associated Press).—Loud cheers greeted Prime Minister Lloyd George when he entered the house of commons this afternoon for a debate on the foreign policies of the government, which is likely to have an important bearing upon his political future.

The Genoa conference formed the text for the debate.

Mr. Lloyd George in beginning his speech said he purposed dealing only with the business of the Genoa gathering and did not intend to discuss German relations or British relations with France, an opportunity for discussion of which would be provided next week.

The prime minister after reviewing the objects of the conference said that in regard to the question whether the conference had succeeded, he would simply state the facts fairly and let the members judge them fairly.

Although peace had been established in Europe it was quite clear, said Mr. Lloyd George, that the war atmosphere to a certain extent remained.

As for Russia, it was hopeless for her, whatever her government, said the premier, to expect to extricate herself from the pit of squalid misery without assistance. There were three alternatives in dealing with the Russian situation, Mr. Lloyd George pointed out. The first was force, which had failed. No one had suggested that at Genoa. The second was to leave Russia to her fate.

"But how," he asked, "could we insure Europe against the risks this policy would involve? The Russo-German agreement shows the sort of peril I mean."

Germany, said the premier, could not re-equip Russia economically, not having the capital, but in the case of armaments there was every natural resource in one country and complete technical skill in the other.

The British delegation, he said, realized it was necessary for the peace of the world, whatever was thought of the soviet government, that some arrangement with Russia be made in order to enable her to help in swelling the volume of trade on which so many millions depend, and in order to give a sense of stability and security to Europe.

Russian leaders, said the prime minister, quite realized they were not going to get credit from the west upon a basis of confiscation and repudiation of debts. They also knew that Russia never would be restored until she got credit. As regards debts of money advanced to Russia before the revolution, he said the Russians were prepared to compromise, saying the obligations they accepted would depend upon the assistance received. He said The Hague conference was to be a practical discussion between the experts on the basis of the Cannes resolutions.

"I am very hopeful," he said, "that when they come down to examination of political propositions something will be achieved."

ROME, May 25.—(By the Associated Press).—A general strike was declared here today in protest against the disorders which occurred last night in the crowded San Lorenzo quarter of Rome, when a procession of fascists returning from the funeral of the national hero, Enrico Toti, clashed with residents of a strongly socialist quarter. More than a score of persons were wounded, including some members of the royal guard, who intervened.

The shutdown notably affected the street car lines and the 29,000 pilgrims now in Rome for the eucharistic congress were for the most part compelled to walk to St. Peter's for the celebration of mass by Pope Pius.

NEGRO'S ESCAPE IS REGARDED AS ACT PROVIDENCE

People Who Wanted to Lynch Colored Man Now Want Him Pardoned—Story of Escape Is Thrilling One—Played With Hounds

MACON, Ga., May 25.—Jim Denson, negro, prayed unusually long in the Bibb county jail last night before he threw himself upon his bunk for his first real sleep this week. He prayed for the members of the mob that broke into the jail at Irwinton Tuesday, dragged him out and attempted to lynch him; and prayed for his ultimate release.

Denson is under sentence to hang on June 16 for an alleged attack upon an aged white woman some three years ago. His case went to the supreme court of the United States.

Act of Providence

Believing that Denson's escape from the mob was an act of Providence, there are numerous persons of this and Wilkinson county, it is reported, who will ask Governor Hardwick to commute his sentence to life imprisonment.

Denson was captured yesterday morning by a posse who did not believe in lynching. They turned Denson over to Sheriff Player of Irwinton. As soon as the negro could be fed and clothed he was rushed to the jail here.

"Lawdy, boss, looks mighty good, jail sho' do," said Denson as the car in which he was riding swerved into the gateway of the local jail.

"Ise sho' mighty proud to be here," said Denson. "Then they dragged me into the car. I asked them to let me pray and they replied they had no time."

Jumped From Car

"I heard them say they would shoot me just out of town. The knot on the rope around my neck was choking me. I reached up one hand in the dark and felt the slipknot. I untied it. The car was speeding thirty miles an hour. I says to myself 'Jim, jump or be killed.' I jumped feet first 'Ram flop' just like that! I hit the ground on my feet and then on my head and then I must have flopped over four times and rolled into the ditch. When I got out of the ditch shots were fired at me. I crawled but they kept on firing. I got up and ran. I was barefooted, my clothes were torn off me and the gravel cut my feet."
