STANFORD AND U.
OF C. READY FOR
FIGHT IN EAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif.—From the far west, two college track teams, representing Stanford University and the University of California, are going to the national championship meet of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America at Harvard University, May 26 and 27 to fight there for first place and, also, to run off the tie in which their 1922 "big meet" at Berkeley, Cal., resulted.

Stanford men think that the several stars on their team will bring enough first-place points at Harvard to win the meet, while California supporters believe their well-balanced team will repeat its performance of last year when it won the Harvard meet and the national title. In the "big meet" here Stanford took ten first places but the large number of California's second and third place points tied up the contest.

One star of the Harvard meet this year probably will be Glenn Hartranft, Stanford, who this year has put the shot 50 feet and 3-8 of an inch, run the 100 yard dash in 10 and 1-5 seconds and hurled the discus 147 feet. Hartranft is expected to win the shot and discus. Another Stanford star may be Morris Kirksey, who last year won the national intercollegiate title in the 100-yard dash. Last year, when Kirksey was in good shape, he ran second only to Charley Paddock, world champion sprinter. This spring his legs have been bothering him. Helping Kirksey will be Eddie Sudden, another Stanford sprinter, who won the two dash events in the meet against California. Williamson, Cardinal quarter miler, who defeated "Oxy" Hendrixson, California, national champion, hopes to bring back the title in that event. His best time this year is 50 and 3-5 seconds. In the javelin throw Stanford will be represented by Captain Flint Hanner, who has hurled the spear 206 feet in practice but whose mark of 197 feet and 1 inch is the Pacific association record. Lane Falk, a point winner in the Harvard meet last year, will run the hurdles for Stanford.

On the California team will be several men who won the national intercollegiate titles in their events at Harvard last year. Leading the team will be Captain Bob Hutchinson, sprinter, who does the 100 in 10 flat and the 220 in 21 and 3-4; Hendrixson, national quarter mile champion for two years; Dick Denton and Charles Dorr, distance men; "Red" Norris, joint holder of the pole vault championship, who has vaulted 12 feet and 9 inches this year; "Briek" Muller, joint holder of the high jump title and Olympic team member; Jack Merchant, versatile star, who throws the hammer 171 feet, 4 and 12 inches, broad jumps 22 feet and 10 inches, puts the shot 44 feet and 7 inches, throws the javelin 165 feet and the discus 125 feet. In 1920, Merchant was the national intercollegiate champion in the hammer throw.

In all, California expects to send fifteen men, the largest team ever sent from the west to the national meet. On the California team only one point winner at Harvard last year, will be missing. He is Sprott, half-miler. Stanford is sending ten men, having left the coast May 19.

Walter Christie, a veteran coach, is directing the California team, while "Dink" Templeton, former Cardinal star, is coach of the Stanford men.

LOS ANGELES, May 25.—"Yes, I'll take on Harry Wills or any other man available. They will all get their chances in their regular turns. It's all up to Kearns and I will do his bidding." So Jack Dempsey addressed a throng of information-seeking newspaper men when he stepped from a rattle here yesterday for seven weeks' sojourn in the city of the Angels. Jack was in buoyant spirits and warmly greeted a large circle of acquaintances who were at the station to welcome him.

After posing for the movie news reels, the world's heavyweight champion busied himself with attending to his English bulldog and German pointer hounds, then, following a short informal chat with the scribes, he hailed a taxi and was whisked away to the home he purchased here some months ago.

Commenting on the recent Harry Greb-Gene Tunney set-to, the champion said that while he thought Greb a mighty good man the latter was "out of the question as a heavyweight possibility simply because he's too light."

"Nobody but a superman can give twenty pounds away and beat a real heavyweight," Dempsey declared.

The discussion finally drifted to the Carpenter-Lewis bout in London.

"Did Carpenter foul Lewis?" queried one of the scribes.

"I saw no foul," Jack responded.

"The blow was fair, all right. Carpenter was just too rugged and good for Lewis."

"And Carpenter—is it a cinch you will meet him in London next year?"

"Unless something goes wrong in the meantime, Carpenter and I will meet again next year and unless he shows great improvement I will beat him again."

Giants Suffer Slump

NEW YORK, May 25.—The Giants were on their way back to the Polo Grounds today after a disastrous invasion of western camps. The world's champions, falling off badly in their hitting and handicapped by ineffective pitching, lost eight of 13 games and had a substantial lead of four games cut to one, which they retained only by taking the final game of the series from Cincinnati 2 to 1 in ten innings after five straight defeats.

Pittsburg kept at the heels of the league leaders by making it three straight from Philadelphia, 11 to 4. The St. Louis Cards whose slump has kept pace with that of the Giants, dropped their fourth straight to Boston 9 to 3. Southworth of the Braves featured at bat with a home run, triple and single.

Babe Ruth twice had an ideal setting for one of his famous punches—the bases full—but failed both times to connect safely with Walter Johnson's speed ball and the Yankees lost to Washington 5 to 3. Bob Meusel clouted out his first home run, but no one was on at the time.

Ty Cobb's Tigers in a slugging bee with Philadelphia featured by Heilmann's two homers, earned another close decision 7 to 6 and hopped back to third place while Cleveland, minus Tris Speaker, lost 6 to 2 to Boston.

Wheat Prices Collapse

CHICAGO, May 24.—Wheat collapsed rapidly in price today and the May delivery quotations tumbled as much as six cents a bushel compared with 24 hours before. The finish was at the bottom figures of the day \$1.32 to \$1.32½.

FATAL SHOOTING
BY GIRL STUDENT
PUEBLO ACADEMY

PUEBLO, Colo., May 25.—Miss Consuelo Baca, aged 18 years, was shot and dangerously wounded at Loretto academy here today by Miss Joseph Liberto, aged 21 years. Miss Liberto called at the academy in a taxicab and asked to see Miss Baca and was permitted to do so, the sister superior thinking the visitor came from Mrs. Baca who was ill. When it was remarked that it was hoped there was nothing serious the woman said there was not.

Soon after the Baca girl met Miss Liberto the sister superior heard a shot and rushing into the room saw the visitor with a pistol and the Baca girl on the floor with a bullet in her head.

Police summoned to the academy arrested Miss Liberto, who they said confessed the shooting, declared Miss Baca had accused her of intimacy with Dr. Baca, which charges Miss Liberto declared to be false.

BUSINESS IMPROVES
THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

NEW YORK, May 25.—A picture of steadily reviving business activity throughout the country is drawn by Secretary Davis in a statement today based on reports of employment conditions to the department of labor. The report indicated unemployment has been practically eliminated in New York state, the secretary said; that it has been reduced more than fifty percent in the past three months in Pennsylvania, while the swansong of business depression has given way to a cheerful note of improved industrial activity in the middle west.

There is "unmistakable evidence" of improved industrial conditions prevailing on the Pacific coast, Mr. Davis said, while in the south the report shows steady improvement.
