RAILROAD RATE
HOLIDAY FAVORED
BY SECY. MELLON

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Declaring a railway rate holiday—during which railroads could make their own rates without government restriction—was suggested today at the treasury as a possible solution of the nation's transportation problem.

The belief was expressed that if a holiday of government rate regulation of five years or more were declared, the railroads could fix their rates to meet the varying conditions in the different sections of the country somewhat on a basis of "what the traffic would bear," and better railroad service and greatly improved industrial and commercial conditions would arise.

Secretary Mellon was represented as favoring the removal of rate restrictions from the railroads and a return to the old competitive basis.

The suggestion advanced at the treasury was made merely as one of the possible solutions of the transportation problem but was taken as significant in view of the known intention of President Harding to recommend changes in the transportation some time next winter.

GENERAL WU FU
EXERTS CONTROL
IN NORTH CHINA

PEKING, May 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Wu Pei Fu has assumed active direction of the nation's affairs from his headquarters at Pao Ting Fu. He has refused to locate in Peking because, as he explained, he does not desire to associate himself with a government headed by President Hsu Shih Chang.

On the contrary, he wants to remain aloof from both Canton and Peking governments with a view to ascertaining the sentiment of the country as to whether the old parliament should be summoned to elect a new president acceptable to north and south, thus automatically eliminating Hsu Shih Chang and Sun Yat Sen.

"China cannot endure indefinitely under a divided government," said General Wu today. The people demand unity, the termination of civil strife and relief from the burden of militarism. The foreign nations are watching us anxiously. Events at both Peking and Canton are said to be progressing favorably toward Wu Pei Fu's plans.
