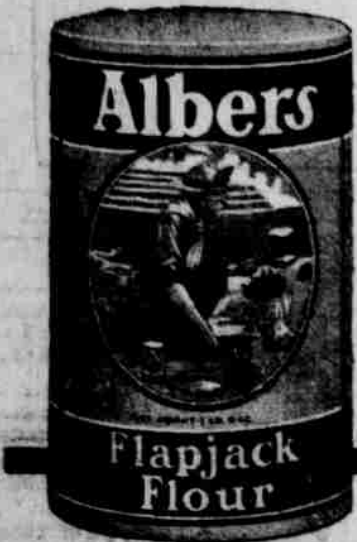

'SHEIK,' STORY OF DESERT AT PAGE

Considered by critics and capacity audiences everywhere as one of the reigning sensations of the current screen season, the "Sheik" comes to the Page theatre this week for a four day run, beginning today with matinees daily at 1:30.

The desert has been fruitful in one direction—fiction. Sahara, more widely known now than ever before, because all the world seems going dry, has exercised an imaginative appeal on creative minds ever since Mohammed went forth to study man and his needs in the silences and solitudes of the sands. Pierre Loti's "Romance of a Spahi" was not the first romance to be set on the fringe of the African desert—there was Cleopatra's story for instance and George Eber's, not to forget Marietta Bey's story made into a libretto for Verdi's "Aida," over which broods the imminence of the desert.

Maupassant makes furtive trips in his fiction into the land where romance, grandeur and death seem to possess the scene. What youth has not thrilled at stories of adventure up the Nile and traveled breathlessly with H. Rider Haggard's heroes into the mysterious deserts?

Notable in the famous contributions of fiction to the fame of the desert as a place for romance and passion, mystery and adventure, is E. M. Hull's novel, "The Sheik." From the first it was inevitable that it would find its way to the screen. Everything argued in favor of success for a picture presentation of the remarkable story of the love of an Arab Sheik for a true Englishwoman. Scene settings, action, mystery, romance and thrilling adventure were ready made for the scenario of such a picture.
