DRY FORCES UNITE TO PREVENT DEFEAT OF CONG. VOLSTEAD

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 26.—Concentration of the temperance forces of eleven states to fight for the re-election of Congressman A. J. Volstead of Minnesota was agreed upon at the anti-saloon league district conference here which closed today, according to R. P. Hutton, state superintendent. The states included in the agreement are Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Iowa, Nebraska, Michigan, North and South Dakota.

"Defeat of Congressman Volstead is desired by the wets for its psychological effect upon the nation," Mr. Hutton said. "The non-partisan league, democrats and wets in his district have combined against him. Their candidate is a minister, who is as dry as Volstead, but they do not care who is elected if they can send word out through the nation that Volstead has been defeated."

The W. C. T. U. is included in the pact.

PRESIDENT SIGNS ANTI-DRUG BILL

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Signature by President Harding of the bill recently passed by congress to strengthen the Harrison anti-narcotic act was announced today at the White House. The new law establishes a federal narcotics board to be composed of the heads of the state, treasury and commerce departments, which is empowered to authorize the importation of such quantities of crude opium and coca leaves as may be found necessary for medicinal and other legitimate purposes. Any alien convicted of violating the act is to be deported, while for others a fine of \$5,000 or ten years imprisonment is provided.

The president also has signed the department of interior appropriation.

ferences, as I see it, is that the republican party has stood for a 'protective tariff' and the democratic party for a 'tariff for revenue.' The settlement of this controversy should include both."

In a plea for impartial governmental control where it is undertaken he insisted that "all lines and departments of economic activity of similar importance should be subjected to the same treatment. There has been a disposition in recent years, he declared, to pass laws which measureably exempt labor organizations and recently, farm associations from governmental investigation, supervision and control against wrong."

To permit such organizations to do, as the result of combination, "things that are claimed to be beneficial to them which are denied to others is to create classes to favor some and to injure the whole body politics," the steel magnate declared.

Too Much Frying
"This is not equal opportunity, and equal obligations," he charged.

In this connection Judge Gary took a fling at "investigation."

"Constant, partisan and reckless indulgences in this pastime by representatives of government or what is much worse, by self appointed unqualified persons posing as public benefactors, may be and often is misleading and antagonistic to the general welfare," he said.

"The bonus question," he declared, "is not yet ripe for determination. Even though there may be two sides of the question as to whether or not a soldier who has escaped disability, physical and mental, should be paid or ask payment of a bonus, it would not be useful for us to consider or form opinions on that question at present."

"There has been considerable propaganda in favor of the proposal," he continued. "Personalities and vituperative comment have been indulged in. Prejudices have been created. High government officials have been opportuned and to a certain extent abused for opposition or lack of interest in the 'soldiers' cause.' National ingratitude for loyalty and sacrifices has been charged. Because of this situation a feeling of unrest and resentment has arisen and the effect upon the natural progress of efforts to return to the normal conditions of peace and progress has been bad."

"Former soldiers, like all others, need opportunity to work and to continuously furnish this chance, courage and capital should be given to industry. The load of taxation ought to be lightened, not increased. Enterprise has staggered under this burden. It would not be difficult to break its back."

"These are not idle words, they are a solemn warning, not only to soldiers, but to everyone who is at present seeking what is neither reasonable nor patriotic."

Of taxation he said: "The fairest method is found in the sales tax, so-called. It is the most easily, cheaply and certainly collected. It has been found in other countries to be practicable, satisfactory and successful."

The present income tax is too expensive collected, Judge Gary said, "and many who are able to pay escape. For the good of all the people a sales tax is desirable."

U. S. TREASURY CONTROVERSY FLARES UP AGAIN, MORE OFFICIALS ARE FIRED

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The Blair-Dover controversy in the treasury decided yesterday as "closed" by Secretary Mellon was again laid before President Harding today with presentation of a petition signed by more than a dozen members of the Ohio delegation in congress asking the re-instatement of C. C. Childs, of Ohio, former supervisor of collectors of the internal revenue bureau.

Almost coincident with the presentation, it became known that Frederick Geilinger of West Virginia, a special assistant in the accounts unit of the bureau had been suspended pending investigation of charges against him.

Mr. Geilinger was appointed by A. D. Sumner, deputy commissioner, who was displaced Tuesday along with Mr. Childs, on order of Secretary Mellon.

Suspension of another official in the bureau, Samuel G. Patchell, chief payroll examiner of the accounts unit, became known a few minutes after it was learned that Mr. Geilinger had been suspended.
