Items of Interest From the Rogue River Valley

A FINE PROGRAM FOR SCHOOL DAY ASHLAND, MAY 17

ASHLAND, May 26.—Having crossed the Rubicon of the local high school graduation day, and with Shrive doings at Medford well nigh over with as applying to this specific date, eyes of the educational continents and their many friends are fixed upon Saturday, May 27, on which date the Jackson County School Day will be observed at Ashland, and some fine weather is greatly to be desired, even if a portion of the many exercises are to be held within doors. Literary activities and musical accompaniments will be supplemented by a well defined athletic field meet, substantial prizes being offered. This annual event has assumed both a scholastic and athletic status, and is being held at various centers throughout the county in rotation, and is looked forward to in the light of a celebration on a big scale, coupled with educational and marathon features. There will also be formal graduation awards in the way of diplomas for pupils of certain grades.

The program for the forenoon will be held in the Chautauqua building and will be as follows:

9 a. m. Band concert.
10:15 a. m. Invocation. Music by high school orchestra. Readings by "Dick" Posey. Music, Oregon songs. Announcements by County Superintendent Homes.

11 a. m. Address by Dr. Dallach of O. A. C. Presentation of diplomas.

At 12 o'clock a basket dinner will be spread in Luthia park, and it is expected that between two and three thousand people will take their dinner there and enjoy an afternoon in the open. Of this number there will probably be a total of at least 1000 people from other parts of the county who will come to see the eighth grade pupils receive their diplomas and enjoy the day in Luthia park.

In the afternoon a program of outdoor sports and drills will be held in the park near the band pavilion:

1:30 p. m. Uniform drill. Track meet: 100 yard dash, boys, free for all; 75 yard dash, girls, free for all; sack race, boys, 13 and 14; sack race, boys, 12 and under; 50 yard dash, girls, 12 and under; baseball throw, girls, 13 and 14; baseball throw, girls, 12 and under; wheelbarrow race, snake race, tug of war, volleyball, etc. May poles. Standing broad jump, boys over 15, tennis racket by Enders. Standing broad jump, boys under 15, official baseball by Simpson.
