PRESBYTERIANS FOR STRINGENT FILM CENSORSHIP

DES MOINES, Ia., May 26.—(By Associated Press). After a debate which lasted nearly all morning, the remainder of the Stone report, entailing a reduction of the agencies of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America from sixteen to four and the creation of a general council to take over the functions of executive commission and the new era movement was adopted in its entirety by the 134th general assembly.

The Rev. Gustav H. Riegler, Pasadena, Cal., pastor and movie censor on the Pacific coast, presented an outline to be followed in the censorship of motion pictures as follows:

Elimination of women in abbreviated costumes.

No scenes of drinking or smoking by men or women, and dancing scenes.

Abolition of all "triangle" plays and scenes dealing with inharmonious home life.

A ban on crime or underworld film scenarios.

Elimination of all death bed "agonies."

A boycott by the general assembly to be maintained by all constituents of the Presbyterian church against all theaters presenting "pictures that are suggestive and unclean," was recommended by the board of temperance and moral welfare.

Certain interests in the motion picture industries it is charged in the presentations "make light of marriage, woman's virtue, the Lord's day, the eighteenth amendment and chastity, thus spreading a moral blight across America and striking at the vitals of the nation in suggesting to the youth of the land ruinous habits."

Existence of a well organized opposition to all efforts to "cleanse a city of a vile picture" and the entrance of the film industry into politics to prevent election of hostile candidates was also alleged in the report.

Debarment of all actors and actresses of notorious and unsavory moral reputation and intemperate habits was also urged.

One commissioner charged the existence of a gigantic tobacco monopoly which was guarding against government action on the cigarette question.

KLAMATH HERALD FEUD IS ENDED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 24.—A controversy which opened December last over the Klamath Record and the Evening Herald, both local dailies, ended today when E. J. Murray, former owner of the Herald, tendered in court a \$1,000 bill and took in return the entire common stock and full control of the Klamath Record. This was in pursuance with the decree of Circuit Judge C. P. Stone, entered ten days ago after hearing the testimony in the case of Murray against the Record. This suit sought the enforcement of a contract dated October 8, 1921, providing for the sale of the Record to him for \$3,000. When he had paid some \$2,000 Murray claimed, the Record refused to carry out the agreement. Murray said today he had not decided what disposition to make of the Record property.

URGE PROTECTION OF RUMANIA

PARIS, May 26.—(By the Associated Press).—Steps have been taken to place France on record as agreeing to protect Roumania's claims to Bessarabia, Vice Premier Barthou announced in an address last night at a dinner given in honor of the Roumanian premier, M. Bratiano.

"M. Bratiano kept his promise, made in 1919, to block the path against the bolsheviks," said M. Barthou. "Today I have signed a bill guaranteeing Bessarabia to Roumania which I trust will pass." The controversy over the territory reached committee discussions during the league meeting but was not disposed of.

OREGON STRAWBERRY SEASON IS OPENED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—The Oregon strawberry season opened here Tuesday with the arrival of one crate from Douglas county and seven crates from Hood River. The Douglas shipment was first on the market and went for \$7.50.

Commission men were holding the Hood River offerings at the same price but they were not moving very fast this morning owing to the competition with California berries which were on the market at \$3 a crate. The first shipment from Kennewick, Wash., arrived here yesterday, two crates selling for \$7.50 apiece.

19 MILES TABLE CLOTHS ON BIG LINER MAJESTIC

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng.—The outfitting of the liner Majestic, 56,000 tons, which made her maiden trip to New York this month was a colossal affair and quite on a par with her size, which is the largest in the world. Seventeen tons of blankets, 16 quires of sheets, 10½ miles of bed covers were being utilized for the sleeping apartments.

For the dining rooms there were 19 miles of table cloths and 29,000 pieces of glassware. China and earthenware totalled 80,000 pieces.

The electroplate and cutlery consists of 50,000 pieces, with an extra 5500 pieces for the French restaurant.

The crew of the ship will wear something like five and one-half miles of aprons during a passage.
