"There is an area of very light barometric pressure northeast of us and a low barometer south of us, which causes a high whirling wind."

CIRCUS BANDS TO PLAY IN PARADE MEMORIAL DAY

The circus next Tuesday will not interfere with the Memorial day exercises, as the circus parade will not be given until after the Memorial day parade and exercises are over, and the management of the circus will furnish two bands, one of white musicians and the other of colored musicians for the Memorial day parades.

The above information was contained in a telegram received today by City Recorder M. L. Alford from Frank A. Cassidy, the general agent of the Howo's Great London circus and Van Amburg's Trained Wild Animals. The city recorder had been trying all week to locate Cassidy by telegram relative to the protest being raised here, and finally reached him in Seattle. The general agent further wires that the circus will cooperate in every way so as to not have the Memorial day program marred by the circus.

William Offutt, marshal of the Memorial day parade, will welcome the two circus bands in his parade. It is pointed out that it is appropriate to have a colored band in such a parade because the Civil War was fought to free the negroes, and during the world war the ex-service men often marched to music of enlisted colored bands, both in camps and into battle. In addition it is probable that a large proportion of both of the circus bands are ex-service men.
