

ELMER SIMMONS IS INDICTED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

Elmer Simmons, indicted by the last grand jury on a charge of violating the prohibition law, was arraigned in the circuit court Friday and entered a plea of not guilty, and his trial was set for next October. Simmons was detained by the Siskiyou county, California, officials, and released upon \$1000 bonds upon arrival here Thursday night. The trial was postponed upon the plea that he had a \$7 a day job in the woods near Weed, and that a continuance would enable him to keep his family and prepare his defense. This was agreed to by the sheriff and the district attorney.

As a side issue of the arrest of Simmons, Bert Moses, county jailer, quit his berth, and a man by the name of Collins from Gold Hill was appointed to fill his place.

Several years ago Simmons is said to have been a special deputy sheriff investigating the supposed murder of a prospector, whose body was found in the Aplegate section.

Simmons disappeared about the time of his indictment, and it was rumored that this was to be used as the basis of a recall of Sheriff Terrill.

That official immediately secured a number of affidavits and the source of the "tip" was revealed. It is claimed, Simmons, in the presence of a number of Jackson and Siskiyou county officials, including Assessor Coleman, declared Sheriff Terrill blameless, and vigorously refused to sign any affidavits against him when requested.

FINAL EFFORT TO SAVE IRELAND IS LAUNCHED TODAY

LONDON, May 27.—(By Associated Press). With the arrival of Michael Collins from Dublin today the Irish conference was expected to bring discussion of the agreement reached between the political factions in southern Ireland last Saturday and its effect on the treaty setting up the Irish free state.

How seriously the issue is regarded in some quarters is evidenced by the comment of the Times parliamentary correspondent who says it is "of solemn and momentous importance. Inasmuch as if an ominous or doubtful construction should be put on the coalition compact, it will bring this country and Ireland perilously near a state of war."

There is, however, more optimism in Dublin than in London, according to the Daily Mail's Dublin correspondent.

Three meetings will be held today. Michael Collins and his colleagues will meet at 4 p. m., while the British signatories to the Anglo-Irish treaty are conferring with Prime Minister Lloyd George. At six o'clock a joint meeting of the British and Irish delegates will be held with Prime Minister Lloyd George presiding.

Mr. Collins had a half hour's preliminary conversation with Winston Churchill, secretary for the colonies at the colonial office.

EX-MEDFORDITE IS SENT TO M'NEIL'S

The following article regarding a former Medford man was taken from a yesterday's Portland paper:

From a prominent and respected engineer in the Panama canal zone, highly esteemed by President Roosevelt, W. T. Dozier dropped to the status of a convict at McNeil island, where he was this morning sentenced for two years by Judge Wolverton for using the mails to defraud.

Dozier appeared in federal court and pleaded guilty to the charge, sentence was immediately imposed. For seven years Dozier was an engineer in the canal zone and he carries in his pocket a letter of the highest recommendation from Theodore Roosevelt. He will serve his term at McNeil island because he obtained appointment as agent for various mercantile companies in Oregon, obtained credentials from them, and then went over the country taking orders for various kinds of merchandise and receiving payment therefor, and failing to return the money to the concerns which he was representing.

Mr. Dozier was formerly a resident of this city and was well known by a number of people here, having resided in or near Medford for four or five years.

LONDON, May 27.—Reuter's correspondent in Cairo, Egypt says he learns from a high official who arrived there last night from Syria that the report of Charles R. Crane's conviction by a French military court at Damascus for inciting a riot is without foundation.

BELIEVE DORAN KNOWS ABOUT TAYLOR MURDER

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., May 27.—County authorities here announced today that developments in the case of Frank Doran, being held here for holding up a taxi driver led them to believe that Doran was either a party to the murder of William D. Taylor, the Los Angeles movie director, or has important information concerning it.

What the source of information was the officials refused to state. Doran maintained silence in his cell in the county jail, refusing to make any statement.

It was definitely learned today that Doran is not the man sought in Chicago for the murder of two policemen. The men sought are said by the authorities to be entirely different types of men.

Jess Barnes and Artie Nehf turned back their former pals, the Boston Braves yesterday, pitching the champions to a double victory 6 to 2 and 10 to 2.

The Pirates fell before St. Louis and the pitching prowess of Bill Doak who chalked up his seventh victory of the season. Rogers Hornsby, his clouting teammate, hit his eleventh home run and today was but one behind his American league rival, Kenneth Williams.

The Yankees, without Ruth again for a day, struck a Tartar in Zachary and Washington had little trouble winning 3 to 1.

Brooklyn took a brace of games from the downcast Phillies, marking the seventh straight victory for the Dodgers, who moved into fourth place. It was the eleventh consecutive setback for the Quakers.

Ferdie Schupp, former Giant southpaw, won his first game since essaying a "comeback" holding the St. Louis Browns in check and giving Chicago a two to one victory.

The Athletics lost to Boston 7 to 6. Cleveland defeated Detroit 8 to 3. In the third double-header of the day, Chicago and Cincinnati split even.

Britton-Long Fight Draw. OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 27.—Ray Long, a rugged Oklahoma rig product, fought Jack Britton, welterweight boxing champion, to a draw in their 12 round decision bout last night.

Long, a comparative outsider made Britton extend himself to the limit to hold his crown and carried the battle to the champion during most of the bout. Never did he show an inclination to back up under Britton's assaults and more than once displayed willingness to take hooks from the

champion in order to bring Britton's head within range of his swinging left. Both men were in good shape when the final gong sounded. Long's draw with the champion duplicated the feat of Dave Shade, Pacific coast welter, who met Britton in Madison Square Garden.

NEW YORK—Edmund Belty of Boston won the A. A. U. heavyweight boxing championship, knocking out Emory P. Ward of Maryland in the third round.

CHICAGO—The American Legion national athletic committee laid preliminary plans for holding an annual national athletic event which according to committee members will approach Olympic games in brilliance of performance and records made.

ELDORADO, Ark.—Bob Martin, A. E. F. heavyweight champion, scored his 95th knockout when he stopped Sailor Bill Maxon in three rounds.

PARIS—Georges Carpentier says he is ready and anxious to defend his title of light-heavyweight champion of the world against Harry Greb.

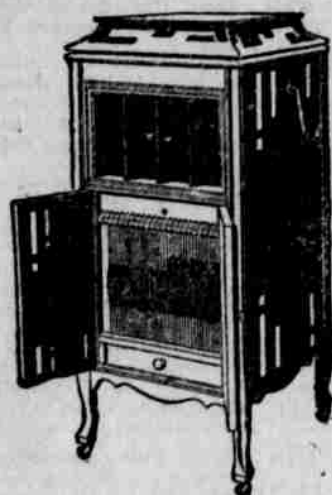
