SANTA FE FLIER
WRECKED, 2 KILLED

CHICAGO, May 29.—(By the Associated Press)—The engineer and fireman of a westbound California limited on the Santa Fe were killed about four o'clock this morning near Madison, Iowa, when the train crashed head on into east bound train No. 4. No passengers were injured and only the engines of the two trains left the track.

The engineer was O. N. Eaton of Chicago and fireman D. Taylor of Chillicothe, Ill., according to reports to Santa Fe officials here.

The east bound train was running in three sections, the first section being struck by the west bound train. According to Santa Fe officials here all reports indicate that the engineer who was killed ran past a stop signal.

Both engines were badly damaged by the head-on crash, but although badly splintered, no cars left the rails.

MONARCHISTS CRUSHED
BY VOTE IN HUNGARY

BUDAPEST, May 29.—First returns from the Hungarian parliamentary elections indicate an overwhelming victory for the government. The Carlist right wing, or monarchist party, is regarded as crushed and it seems probable that the social democrats will make a great gain.

The election of seventy-four government and six opposition candidates is assured so far.

K. K. K. Silliest Hoax
Ever Put Over On
Public, Says Judge

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29.—When Dr. John D. Eckers, dentist, a kinsman of the Ku Klux Klan appeared in the court of Police Judge Sylvester A. McAtee to answer to a charge of failing to support his minor child, Judge McAtee characterized the Klan as "the silliest hoax ever put over on the American public." The hearing will be continued Wednesday.

The charge was brought by Dr. Eckers' divorced wife after he had been arrested on six charges of violating the corporation securities act in connection with his acting as a broker for certain oil stocks. He was compelled to remain in jail in default of \$10,000 bail.

"How a good American citizen can belong to a silly organization that goes about in masks and nightgowns is more than I can see," Judge McAtee said. "I am going to give the Ku Klux Klan an exhibition of orderly justice in this case by way of contradiction of the outrageous methods which it pursues."
