SPEAKER PAYS RESPECTS TO K. K.

"Let There Be Light" is the title of the lecture of Dr. Arthur Walsyn Evans, speaker at last night's Chauqua, and he certainly turned the searchlights on full force. He hunted out every nook and corner where the foes of America lurk and exposed them to a glare of brilliant eloquence.

With sledgehammer sentences he tore apart the pretensions of the Ku Klux Klan. He denounced the organization as "dangerous menace" to democratic government and declared his intention to express his full opinion of all public questions. He searched his soul for words to express his American disapproval of masked attempts to supersede the American government with mob rule, and the audience responded with cheers and loud applause.

Avowing his ironclad Protestantism and asserting that he was a member of the Masonic order, Evans declared that he knew the reason for his religious faith but knew no reason why any American should support an organization which appealed to race and religious hatred and sought to upset the principle of religious freedom that is the foundation of American liberty.

Agriculture Bloc Wins.
WASHINGTON, May 29.—The republican agricultural tariff bloc, won its first fight today in the senate and the finance committee majority. Its first reverse since the consideration of the tariff bill was begun five weeks ago.

With the aid of a solid democratic vote and some non-member republicans, the tariff bloc succeeded in having cyanide restored to the free list.

Babe Ruth Distanced

NEW YORK, May 29.—While Babe Ruth is going hitless as well as home-runless his rivals are pounding out a fast increasing margin for the king of clouters to shoot at when he regains his slugging stride. Rogers Hornsby, great second baseman of the St. Louis Nationals slammed out a brace of homers yesterday, increasing his total to 13 and took the lead from his American league fellow townsmen, Kenneth Williams who has 12, and "Ding" Miller of the Athletics, close behind him with 11. Incidentally Hornsby reached a level with Ruth's 1921 record pace, although the latter made it 14 just a year ago this afternoon.

The home run epidemic also spread to Washington and Brooklyn, Joe Judge's clout scoring three runs, tied the Yanks and enabled Washington to win in the tenth 4 to 3 while Walter Johnson held the Yanks in check, Ruth failing to get the ball out of the infield in five times at bat.

Zack Wheat rapped out a four-ply blow with three men on bases but Boston won from the Dodgers 5 to 4. Frank Frisch had an off day in the field and made four errors, but the Giants hit Winters hard with men on bases and easily beat Philadelphia for their fifth straight win 8 to 1.

Chicago won a loosely played game from Cincinnati after Alexander had been driven from the box. Sensational fielding and timely hitting, especially by Gerber, enabled St. Louis to down the White Sox while five Cleveland pitchers failed to stop Detroit and Cobb's men won 8 to 5.

Decisions of U. S. Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(By the Associated Press)—Aliens enjoying fishing rights in the Columbia river prior to 1913 claimed under the provisions of the compact between Oregon and Washington are not exempt from the law enacted by Oregon in 1919 providing that only citizens should be issued license to fish for salmon with fixed appliances. It was held today by the supreme court. The statute previously had been sus-

tained by the United States district court for Oregon and the district court of appeals for the ninth district.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Chinese arriving in the United States prior to the immigration act of February 25, 1917, can be deported by an administrative order, it was held today by

the supreme court in a case involving the deportation of four Chinese by order of the commissioner of immigration at San Francisco.
